Lucas still faces six murder charges

United Press International Oct. 18 in Henrietta, 20 HENRIETTA — Henry Lee southeast of Wichita Falls. Lucas, who has been sentenced to 75 years for one of the more than 150 murders he claims to have committed across the coun-try, still faces charges in six other murders

Lucas pleaded guilty to the stabbing death of 80-year-old Kate Rich of Ringgold. Portions of her body were found in a woodburning stove in Lucas' shack in Stoneburg, Texas.

The conference was arranged after Lucas and his alleged accomplice, Ottis Elwood Toole, admitted last week abducting and killing a Northeast Louisiana University coed in 1981.

Toole, 36, is serving a Florida prison term for second-degree arson and has been indicted for Friday. first-degree murder in Jacksonville, Fla. Lucas and Toole have been identified as suspects in at least eight Florida killings.
