A-bomb pilot: U.S. policy is split

HARLINGEN — The pilot who flew the B-29 that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, on Aug. 6, 1945, said Thursday "the communists are smiling over their vodka" at the divisions within the United States over military policy.

"As long as the communists see us split the way we are, they are smiling as they sit back and drink vodka," said retired Gen. Paul Tibbets, 68, of Columbus, Ohio.

"We fought a war to make the world safe for Democracy," Tibbets said. "Today I'm worried whether my grandchildren and great-grandchildren will enjoy that privilege."

Tibbets was at the controls of the B-29 "Enola Gay" that dropped the first A-bomb that produced an explosion equivalent to 20,000 tons of TNT, and leveled Hiroshima.

The 9,000-pound bomb killed an estimated 78,000 people in a matter of seconds and injured another 51,000 and was instrumental, along with a second A-bomb dropped on Nagasaki, in forcing the Japanese to surrender and end World War II.

He repeated Thursday his often-quoted statement that he never has lost any sleep over his role in dropping the bomb because he believes the bomb saved more lives than it took by ending the war quickly.

Tibbets said he has had no access to classified information since he retired 16 years ago, but from what he has read and heard from friends still in uniform.

"My basic reaction is we are not as well equipped as we could be," Tibbets said. "I don't think

we're prepared to fight a war, because I don't think we know what kind of a war we would fight. Korea and Vietnam showed we are not prepared to fight a war, that politically, we do not intend to win. Somebody has to make up their minds what we're going to do.

Since World War II, Tibbets said, the United States has had

only "one enemy" and that is communism because it is diametrically opposed to democracy. He said communism has taken territory in Europe, the Middle East, Africa and Central America.

In the nuclear age, Tibbets said, readiness is more important than it was during the isolationism that preceded the attack

on Pearl Harbor that brought the United States directly into World War II.

Tibbets said the United States would not have time to prepare for World War III. "The only thing they understand is strength," Tibbets said. "The time and the place will have to be selected by our military strategists."

Cotton harvest starts this week

COLLEGE STATION — This week's weather allowed Texas farmers to move ahead with harvest operations, but dry conditions continued to plague western areas.

state, with weather being a major factor. Some cotton farmers in western areas are applying defoliant and drying agents to prepare the crop for harvesting.

Cotton harvesting was the main farm operation, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said Thursday in its weekly report.

In addition to cotton, farmers are also harvesting corn, grain sorghum, sugar beets, soybeans, sunflowers and peanuts.

Hay making continued in southern areas, with some second and third cuttings being harvested in the Coastal Bend.

Cotton yields have ranged from fair to excellent over the state, with the weather being a major factor.

The demand for hay will be great this fall and winter, particularly in western areas where hay feeding is already under way due to the drought, the Extension Service said.

The sugar cane crop is maturing in the Rio Grande Valley and harvesting will start soon. The Valley's citrus crop looks good and a few early oranges are being picked.

Cotton harvesting was under way over most of Texas, from coastal areas to the South Plains where a few early bales have been ginned.

Texas is boasting a bumper pecan crop this year, with some early varieties starting to hull, the Extension Service said.
