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

## Dupe' on trial in bomb case

HOUSTON — A Colorado man who pleaded guilty in the \$15 million Gulf Oil Chemicals Co. bomb plot in Texas last year testified Tuesday that an associate he originally described as a dupe was really a coconspirator.

John McBride, who is serving a 40-year plea-bargained sentence in the case, testified against Ted McKinney, 46, who is on trial charged with 12 counts including extortion in the Septem-

ber 1982 plot foiled by the FBI. McBride, 46, of Durango, Colo., said in an Oct. 3, 1982 statement to the FBI that he masterminded the plot and tricked the innocent McKinney

out.

In that original statement, McBride said he threatened McKinney's wife, Carla Cooper, to keep McKinney involved after McKinney realized what was happening. McKinney, a former Univer-

Durango at the time the plot was developed, has adopted the original McBride statement as his defense.

McBride now says that statement was a lie to try to gain freedom for his wife, Jill Bird, 37, and minimum sentences for

In a statement, John ploded harmlessly. McBride said he threatened Ted McKinney's wife, Carla Coopsity of Texas-San Antonio pro-fessor who was mining near after McKinney realized what was happening.

McBride also testified that McKinney picked out the extor-tion payoff location near Phoenix, Ariz. FBI agents foiled the plot. They arrested McKinin Phoenix, as well as another participant who pleaded guilty, Michael Worth, 34. Other arrests followed.

On cross-examination, McKinney's lawyer, John Acker-man of Houston, focused on McBride's changes in his story, including his new claim that Worth - not himself - masterminded the plot.
