'Dupe' on trial in bomb case

HOUSTON Press — A Colorado man who pleaded guilty in the \$15 million Gulf Oil Chemicals Co. bomb plot in Texas last year testified Tuesday that an associate he originally described as a dupe was really a co-conspirator.

John McBride, who is serving a 40-year plea-bargained sentence in the case, testified against Ted McKinney, 46, who is on trial charged with 12 counts including extortion in the September 1982 plot foiled by the FBI.

McBride, 46, of Durango, Colo., said in an Oct. 3, 1982 statement to the FBI that he masterminded the plot and tricked the innocent McKinney into becoming involved. The

statement said McKinney was "aghast" when he learned a crime was underway and wanted out.

In that original statement, McBride said he threatened McKinney's wife, Carla Cooper, to keep McKinney involved after McKinney realized what was happening.

McKinney, a former University of Texas-San Antonio professor who was mining near Durango at the time the plot was foiled, has adopted the original McBride statement as his defense.

McBride now says that statement was a lie to try to gain freedom for his wife, Jill Bird, 37, and minimum sentences for others involved. McBride now

says McKinney was an active participant.

McBride denied in court

In a statement, John McBride said he threatened Ted McKinney's wife, Carla Cooper, to keep him involved after McKinney realized what was happening.

Tuesday that he ever threatened McKinney, and said McKinney voluntarily provided explosives from his mine for five bombs planted at Gulf's Cedar Bayou

chemical plant near Houston. Although the plant was evacuated and shut down for several days, the bombs were found and disarmed. One was exploded harmlessly.

McBride also testified that McKinney picked out the extortion payoff location near Phoenix, Ariz. FBI agents foiled the plot. They arrested McKinney in Phoenix, as well as another participant who pleaded guilty, Michael Worth, 34. Other arrests followed.

On cross-examination, McKinney's lawyer, John Ackerman of Houston, focused on McBride's changes in his story, including his new claim that Worth — not himself — masterminded the plot.

McBride admitted he had testified and had reduced sentence and been California prison to be wife, who is serving five probation.

He also testified he hopes to lift a conditional probation forbidding him with him.
