DeLorean videotapes to be aired

LOS ANGELES — An appeals court Sunday threw out an order that blocked CBS from broadcasting duplicates of government videotapes showing the surveillance and arrest of John DeLorean in his cocaine trafficking case.

The network said it would air the tapes Sunday night. Attorneys for the former automaker said they would immediately appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court in hopes of heading off the broadcast.

U.S. District Court Judge Robert Takasugi Saturday issued the order prohibiting CBS and its affiliate, KNXT, from broadcasting the tapes.

After an emergency hearing Sunday, a three-judge panel of

the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals unanimously voted to overturn Takasugi's order.

William Vaughn, an attorney for CBS, said Takasugi had overstepped legal bounds in making his ruling.

"He has no constitutional power to do what he did," Vaughn said. He said the case involved a "familiar collision" between a defendant's right to a fair trial and freedom of the press.

But Howard Weitzman, DeLorean's attorney, said, "I'm afraid the balancing is going to be ratings versus a fair trial."

He said airing of the videotapes would result in a bliz-

zard of publicity and "unleash a circus unprecedented in judicial history."

DeLorean, who is free on \$5 million bail, was scheduled for trial Nov. 1.

Prosecutor James Walsh joined defense attorneys in asking the court to uphold Takasugi's order to block airing of the tapes.

"I don't see the need to jeopardize the appropriate discharge of a case that has dragged on now for a year," Walsh said. He said the tapes would be made public in two to three weeks once they are introduced as evidence, and CBS's desire for a "scoop" should not be allowed to possibly force a delay or relocation of the trial.

"They're dynamite — or at least that's what they are perceived to be," Walsh said. "That's why they want them out now."

But Vaughn insisted it was a question of constitutional rights.

"If CBS is restrained for even an hour, or a day, then you have a clear violation of the Constitution," Vaughn said.

At one point attorneys were scolded for allowing the tapes, which were under seal, to get into the hands of the news media.

In a letter to Takasugi, Weitzman claimed KNXT was given duplicates of the tapes by Hustler magazine publisher Larry Flynt. CBS officials declined to say how the network got its copies.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Layn Phillips, a prosecutor in the case, said his office had called in the FBI to thoroughly investigate the matter, and intends to pursue all possible leads to find the leak.

Propane leak closes U.S. 60

FAIRVIEW, Okla. — Officials Sunday removed an overturned truck that leaked propane gas and closed a highway north of Fairview.

The leaking gas forced the closing of a mile-long stretch of U.S. 60 from just north of Fairview to the State Highway 58 junction in Fairview Saturday. Several businesses also were evacuated.

Fairview Fire Chief Mike Howerton said a semi-trailer truck accidentally forced a truck loaded with 9,000 gallons of liquid propane into a ditch. He said the collision punctured the propane tank, permitting the gas to escape.

The propane truck was owned by United LP Gas of Texas, Howerton said, and was driven by Jack Clifton. The driver of the semi-trailer rig was injured, he said.

Killer waits for word on scheduled execution

NEW ORLEANS — Condemned killer Robert Wayne Williams Sunday waited to hear whether an appeals panel would move him from a Tuesday execution for killing an elderly security guard with a shotgun blast.

since the U.S. Supreme Court in 1976 allowed capital punishment.

In addition, Williams' appeal asked for a review of the issue of proportionality, the question of whether some inmates receive death for crimes that result in life sentences for other prisoners.

Williams' attorney, Sam Dalton, Saturday asked a three-judge panel of the Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to halt the death row inmate's electrocution.

Dalton argued the death penalty given Williams, a black, should be set aside because the sentence was handed down by an all-white jury. Williams was scheduled to die in Louisiana's electric chair between midnight and 1 a.m. Tuesday.

The condemned killer would be the second black executed
