The welfare savings during the federal fiscal year ending Sept. 30 resulted from an alien verification system that involved cooperation by the INS and California Employment Development Department, Ezell

INS figures showed that workers reviewed 25,821 welfare applications for citizenship or residency status and that 76 percent — or 19,673 — were assumed to be ineligible. INS Commissioner Alan Nelson said the assumption was made when the applicants failed to return with requested additional infor-

The figures give a "clearer picture as to the kind of drain on the economy in the state of California that really is threatening, to a degree, our economic survival," Ezell said.

There has been very little publicity about the tutorial program over the last two years," he said. "Consequently, it hasn't been very effective."

Swartzwelder said the new tutorial program would serve a dual purpose because it will allow students to more readily find available tutoring services and it will use more of the University's academic resources.



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



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
