In order to qualify as a candidate for a degree in the College of Science, each student must demonstrate an ability to express himself/herself in acceptable English. This requirement may be satisfied by (1) passing an examination in English composition (EPE) taken not later than the spring semester of the junior year, or (2) completing English 301 at Texas A&M University with a minimum grade of "C".

Any student who fails the written examination (EPE) must satisfy the English Proficiency requirement designated by his/her respective department.

Students in the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, and Mathematics desiring to complete the EPE this semester or who have a conflict with the designated testing date should see Mrs. Riedel, Room 152 AAA Building. Students in the Department of Physics should report to the designated location on the day of testing. This year, the physics department received Nobel laureate Sheldon Glashow. Having such a person at the University brings public attention to the department and the University, Jennings said.

The prominent person also brings attention to other work being done at the University.

Whenever someone of great prominence comes to a university, he attracts other qualified researchers as well as funding

from private profit and non-profit organizations and federal and state governments, he said. Jennings said it often is easier to find funding for research projects when someone prominent is associated with them.

Texas A&M spent about \$104 million on research in the 1982-83 fiscal year, which ended in August, making it the leader in the state. Of the \$104 million, 42 percent was from the federal government, 42 percent from the state government and 16 percent from private profit and non-profit organizations or industry.

Jennings expects funding to increase, especially from the federal government. Currently most of the state funds go to

agriculture and engineering research. Federal funding is used in areas that state funds do not cover, and as research in those areas increases, so will funds.

Since research in areas other than agriculture and engineering will expand in the future, Jennings predicts that funding in those areas will increase also.

Industrial funding may not show a substantial increase, but with the construction of the in-

dustrial park on the new campus, faculty will have more chance to become involved in the needs of industry. Jennings said.

The industrial park will cause an increase in funding given to the University by the state, but there will be a flow between the industry and research and University.

In addition to research, presence of industry will open opportunities to graduate students to find opportunities. Jennings

Film depicts women's lives as astronauts

HOUSTON Press International — Sally Ride is famous throughout the world as America's first female astronaut in space, but she plays no role in a television movie showing Hollywood's version of the first three women astronauts.

CBS television has begun filming "The Sky's No Limit", a fictional drama about the personal lives of the first three women to apply to the astronaut corps.

Peter Rich, CBS second unit director and location manager, conceded the timing of the movie's filming coincides with Ride's current popularity, but he emphasized the movie "in no way" resembles the real-life story of America's first female astronaut to fly in space.

"It is not patterned after Sally Ride at all. The idea has been about three years in the making. We have specifically tried to stay away from a Sally Ride story," Rich said.

"It's more of a human story. It's a story about three women and their personal lives. They happen to be astronaut candidates," he said.

Stars of the movie include Sharon Gless, of "Cagney & Lacey"; Dee Wallace, who played the mother in "E.T.," and Anne Archer, of "Family Tree".

Film locations include NASA's Johnson Space Center, neighborhoods around the space center and various sites around Houston.
