Texas Marine alive; three not so lucky

The confirmed toll of soldiers from Texas killed in the bombing of Marine headquarters in Lebanon held at three Thursday, but a second Marine from the state was added to the official list of missing servicemen. Despite the grim news elsewhere, a Lubbock family rejoiced after learning Thursday that a missing Marine is alive and well. Pentagon officials notified the family of Gunnery Sgt. E.A. Armstrong shortly before noon that the soldier had been accounted for.

"I'm walking 3 feet off the ground," said Armstrong's mother, Mrs. C.M. Thompson. Thompson said Armstrong's wife, Karen, who is with her critically ill brother in Idaho, was notified first by the Pentagon. The Pentagon list of the more than 220 servicemen killed in the Beirut blast late Thursday included Marine Pfc. Timothy McMahon of Austin; Marine Lance Cpl. Johnny Douglas Ceasar Jr., 22, of El Campo, and Army Spec. 4 Marcus E. Coleman, 19, of Dallas. Listed by the Pentagon as missing were Marine Lance Cpl. David Brown of Conroe and

Lance Cpl. Michael Fulton of Fort Worth. Family members of Gunnery Sgt. E.A. Armstrong of Lubbock said they had not heard from the Marine since the bombing. In San Antonio, a Brooke Army Medical Center burn unit spokesman said late Thursday that there had been no change in the conditions of Lance Cpl. Terry L. Hudson, 22, of Prichard, Ala., and Sgt. John E. Gibson, 25, of Springfield, Mo. Hudson remained in critical condition and Gibson in serious condition.

Company sued for deception

EDINBURG — The state Thursday accused a Hidalgo County company of violating the Deceptive Trade Practices Act by misrepresenting facts about a subdivision it developed in South Texas. A lawsuit, filed by the Texas attorney general's office, seeks \$10,000 in civil penalties from Perez Development Corp., which is owned by Ignacio Perez of Donna. The suit charged the company with failing to disclose there were two mortgages on the land amounting to \$455,000 and falsely representing that consumers could obtain financing through a Weslaco bank.

Metal found in candy kiss

SHREVEPORT, La. — Some peanut butter candy was off the shelves of K & B Drugs stores in our states Thursday, its removal prompted by the discovery of a piece of metal in candy purchased for a church Halloween party. Managers of 121 K & B stores in Louisiana, Texas, Alabama and Mississippi were ordered immediately to stop selling rock Peanut Butter Kisses after the shard of metal was found in a candy sold at a Shreveport store. The metal, measuring 5/8 of an inch by 1/4 of an inch, was discovered by Byron Saxton, 14, when he unwrapped a piece of the taffy-like candy and bit into it. He was not injured. His mother, Mildred, purchased two factory-sealed bags of the individually wrapped candies Oct. 20 for a church Halloween party.

K & B officials ordered the product removed from their stores after being notified of the incident Wednesday. "It was a very isolated incident in one bag of candy," K & B assistant director of operations James LeBlanc said Thursday from New Orleans.

Officials with Brock Candy Co. of Chattanooga, Tenn., speculated the metal may have fallen into the candy during a mechanical failure in the manufacturing process.

"We've heard of no other incidents," Brock said. Metal detectors are used to examine ingredients before the candy is cooked, and the company is purchasing detectors to examine the product before it is packaged, he said.
