Supreme Court refused Monday to lift a stay of execution granted James "Cowboy" Autry only 31 minutes before he would

have died, and attorneys said they expected all Texas execu-tions would be put on hold until the court rules in a California proportionality case.

The justices rejected an appeal from Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox, filed Oct. 17, to allow the execution to proceed because all lower courts ity issue. had approved the punishment

The justices refused, without comment, to hear claims by Texas and the TABC that the U.S. Navy must follow state codes and buy booze from instate wholesalers rather than purchase cheaper liquor from outside Texas

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



United Press International LINCOLN, Neb. — A philo-sophy professor at the Universi-ty of Nebraska-Lincoln jumped to his death early Monday from the 104 Group and the source of the so Hardy Jones, 41, of south Bob Fey.

Jones was teaching two philosophy classes this semester. A university spokesman said professional journals.
