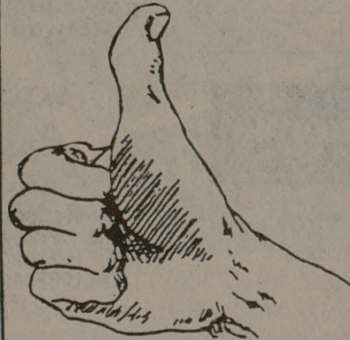

Senator calls for emphasis on environment

AUSTIN — State Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi, Monday called on Gov. Mark White to place the same emphasis on environmental issues as he has education and utility regulation in Texas.

"What I am proposing is nothing less than moving the environment to the front rank on the agenda of Texas public policy issues," Truan said in a letter to White.

Texas needs a "coordinated strategy" among its public officials to deal with air and water pollution problems, he said.

Truan said Attorney Jim Mattox, land Commissioner Garry Mauro, agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower and White have demonstrated a commitment to the environment that was lacking in former Gov. Bill Clements' administration.

Rancher says he's guilty

MARSHALL — A northeast Texas rancher charged with seven federal crimes in the deaths of wild horses he adopted under a program created to protect the animals pleaded guilty

Monday to two misdemeanor charges.

Joe Corbett, of Pittsburg, pleaded guilty to two counts of willfully failing to notify the Bureau of Land Management within seven days after the

deaths of two of the wild horses.

Corbett originally was charged with conspiracy, a felony, and six misdemeanor counts of inhumane treatment. But the other charges against him were dropped under a plea bargain agreement with federal prosecutors.

Under the agreement, a conspiracy indictment against Pittsburg banker Thomas Clemens, who was accused of making false statements on papers filed by Corbett with the wild horse adoption program, also was dismissed.

The plea bargain agreement angered humane society members who were among the first people to report dead and dying horses on Corbett's ranch. Twenty-five of the 168 wild horses adopted by Corbett were found dead on his ranch in November 1982. Another 23 died of malnutrition and other causes after they were taken from Corbett.

"It's a joke is what it is," said Barbara King of the Titus County Humane Society. "I can't be-

lieve they let something like go by on two counts of no-

Corbett was tried earlier year on federal cruelty charges but the case ended with a locked jury. Assistant Attorney Bill Cornelius plea bargain agreement reached because of the hood of a second hung jury.

"I never did think the charges had much jury appeal," he said. "We were in a state where retrying the case would be a considerable expense of time and expense."

Corbett's attorney, Ed McFarland, said the charges "shouldn't have ever been filed. The rancher declined one until after his Dec. 5 sentence. He could receive up to one year in jail and a \$2,000 fine on count.

Clemens, an officer at Pittsburg National Bank, testified Corbett's first trial and was charged with conspiracy allowing the rancher to use horses for collateral on a loan even though the federal government held title to the ani-

EPA OKs use of poison 1080

WASHINGTON — The Environmental Protection Agency announced Monday it will allow western ranchers to use a deadly poison, compound 1080, to kill coyotes that prey on sheep.

In a long-awaited decision, the agency said that after it works out certain regulatory details, it will permit ranchers to use the controversial poison in two ways — on "toxic collars" attached to the necks of sheep and in "single-lethal dose" meat baits intended to attract coyotes.

"This final decision will now

allow parties to apply to EPA for registration of compound 1080 for the two uses allowed," the agency said in a statement.

"In addition to meeting registration standards, registration of compound 1080 must meet a number of medical and close restrictions on the use of the pesticide," it cautioned.

Environmentalists, who battled efforts to allow use of highly toxic poison, immediately vowed to challenge the decision in court.

Defenders of Wildlife, a national environmental group, closely following the issue, filed a notice of appeal at the Circuit Court of Appeals in Washington, said Sarah Verman, legislative director for the group.

Vickerman charged EPA's action could "put the hands of virtually every who wants to use it in a highly concentrated form."

The toxic collar is a "reservoir" with a solution of 1080 attached to the neck of a lamb or goat. The EPA said limitations and restrictions of use of the collar will be developed in later proceedings.

The single-lethal dose is a small ball or cube of meat-tallow material containing a lethal dose of the compound. The decision authorizes 5 to 10 grams of the pesticide per bait.

"The number of baits is limited and will be finally determined only after more information is made available," said the agency.

Other restrictions announced by EPA Assistant Administrator Lee Thomas include limiting bait's application to certain federal and state employment monitoring baits at least seven days, and federal review of 1080's manufacture and distribution.

Developed in Germany during World War II, 1080 was banned by the Nixon administration in 1972 because it can kill animals other than coyotes, including endangered species. It also has been used to kill rodents, prairie dogs, moles and ground squirrels. It can cause paralysis and convulsions and a slow death up to 12 hours.

The Reagan administration supported by the states of Wyoming, Montana and South Dakota, held EPA hearing on the substance in 1982.

Monday's decision affirmed substance of an Oct. 22, 1982 ruling by Administrative Judge Spencer Nissen. Nissen admitted there was no evidence that "overall losses of sheep, lambs to predators have increased" since 1080 was banned but said that for some ranches coyotes "remain a significant cause of loss."
