Lawmen's friends start fund

EL PASO — A fund has been established to help Sheriff's Capt. Willie Hill, who was indicted by a grand jury last week for destroying a cocaine-looking substance found in the county judge's jeep, a group of lawyers announced Tuesday.

Hill was arrested for telling two sheriff's deputies to dispose of the suspected drugs found while a police radio was being installed in the judge's vehicle. He is charged with official misconduct and tampering with evidence, both Class A misdemeanors.

Hill said he gave the order because he believed the suspected drugs were planted in the jeep by the judge's political enemies.

Attorney and former city alderman Jim Scherr said that a "Friends of Willie Hill" fund was started because "a lot of attorneys and other people who have worked with Willie Hill believe he will be facing an economic crisis."

"Willie has been an outstanding county official," Scherr said. "He has helped out in many civic causes and raised money for them. He has a family to support during this crisis."

Sheriff Mike Davis Monday suspended Hill pending the outcome of the indictment. But he will still draw his \$25,992-a-year salary.

Officials of the sheriff's department said Hill will lose his job if convicted of either of the charges. Scherr said the fund will help Hill defray costs of legal expenses to defend himself in the nearly year-old case.

The grand jury heard evidence from deputy sheriffs Dwight Jefferson and Jim Boykin who testified they asked Hill for advice after finding the cocaine in the glove compartment of the Toyota jeep in February.

The two testified that they intended to dispose of the cocaine. Sheriff Chief Deputy Tom Lier said Hill's suspension could be called a paid vacation.

"The man is innocent, proven guilty," Lier said, adding that maintaining a working relationship with Hill would be difficult.

Ag secretary switches support for dairy bill

WASHINGTON — Legislators criticized Agriculture Secretary John Block Tuesday for withdrawing support of a bill to pay dairy farmers to reduce production and for supporting a straight cut in the milk price instead.

Disapproving Block's switch, House Agriculture Chairman Kika de la Garza, D-Texas, said that in late September Block wrote to Senate Agriculture Chairman Jesse Helms, R-N.C., that failure of

Congress to act on the bill to pay farmers to reduce output could eventually destroy the dairy program.

But last Friday, Block wrote to House Republican leader Robert Michel that he would support an amendment by Rep. Barber Conable, R-N.Y., that would cut the milk price support level by \$1.50 to \$11.60 per 100 pounds of milk. If that amendment were enacted, Block said he would reduce the support level initially by \$1.10 to \$12.

Rep. Edward Madigan, R-Ill., ranking Republican on the committee, defended Block. He said that his support of the dairy measure was linked to congressional consideration of legislation to freeze grain and cotton target prices, which Congress has failed to do.

A spokesman for the National Milk Producers Federation, an umbrella organization for the dairy cooperatives that supports paying farmers cash to cut back,

expressed surprise at the switch.

"We probably would have expected them (the administrators) to remain at least some of our spokesmen said."

In another development, some dairy issue, the dairy program crossed a hurdle on Tuesday when the House Rules Committee participated in seven key amendments debated by the House, a controversial bill that would be passed by the House.

The House Agriculture Committee tried Oct. 18 to pass a House-Senate conference report. House-Senate conference report 208 to 188 vote, paving the way for debate on several amendments.

The Senate passed the bill Oct. 7 to pay dairy farmers (intram back production). The measure would provide \$10 for every 100 pounds of milk produced up to 30 percent and a deduction. It would be 50 cents per 100 pounds of milk and would assess them 50 cents per 100 pounds of milk.

The measure would also reduce support level by 50 cents per 100 pounds.
