# DOE asked about aliens

**WASHINGTON**—Reps. Jim Wright and Kika de la Garza, both D-Texas, have asked Education Secretary Terrel Bell how he plans to allocate \$30 million in the Education Department's budget for alien education, aides said Tuesday.

The \$30 million became available after Congress approved it as part of a continuing resolution to keep government afloat until lawmakers approve appropriations funding for the Department of Education and other federal agencies.

House Majority Leader Wright and de la Garza have been working to help states like Texas with the financial burden of providing free education to illegal alien schoolchildren as ordered by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Celia Hare Martin, de la Garza's aide, said the congressman already had planned to make a speech to a private club, meet with businessmen, attend a reception in his honor and go to a fund-raising appreciation dinner in McAllen before the Nov. 21 date was set for the EPA hearing.

She said de la Garza only attends the planned appreciation dinner every four or five years. She added that the McAllen Civic Center had been rented for the dinner prior to the EPA setting the hearing.

"My colleague and good friend, Jim Wright, battled hard to convince the House to approve \$30 million now and to use it in implementing programs under my Emergency Immigrant Education Act," said de la Garza.

The act has passed the House but has yet to be considered in the Senate. However, last weekend's action makes the money available for the federal

government to "assume responsibilities in this matter," said la Garza.

"Alien education has created an unfair burden on local school districts that lack necessary buildings and technical facilities for educating immigrant children — and this places a burden on local taxpayers when the federal government should be supporting this kind of educational effort," he said.

# Group upset that de la Garza unable to make public hearing

**MCALEN** — Environmentalists opposing the burning of toxic wastes in the Gulf of Mexico are upset that Rep. Kika de la Garza, D-Texas, will not attend next week's public hearing on the matter.

The group also has gathered 10,000 signatures on petitions seeking the presence of Sen.

John Tower, R-Texas, at the Environmental Protection Agency hearing next Monday in Brownsville.

Celia Hare Martin, de la Garza's aide, said the congressman already had planned to make a speech to a private club, meet with businessmen, attend a reception in his honor and go to a fund-raising appreciation dinner in McAllen before the Nov. 21 date was set for the EPA hearing.

He co-authored a bill that implemented the Reagan economic program. The bill called for spending reductions totaling \$143 billion in fiscal years 1983-84.

Ron Paul has served three terms in Congress, and was opposed for re-election to his third term in 1982.

Paul says he believes Congress and the executive branch must cut spending not only domestically, but also in the military and in foreign aid.

His work in cutting spending and taxes won him the highest rating ever given by the National Taxpayers Union. Most recently, Paul was named one of America's 12 outstanding conservatives "most likely to lead after Reagan," by Conservative Digest magazine.

Paul is a graduate of Duke University School of Medicine. He served for five years as a flight surgeon in the U.S. Air Force and the Air National Guard.

Rob Mosbacher, 32, has

never run for office. But in 1982 he was voted one of the 20 rising stars of Texas by Texas Business magazine.

One of the principal and most distinguishing issues of his campaign, Mosbacher says, is that of expanding the role of the private sector.

He served on President Reagan's Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives — a program that shifts the responsibility of housing, health care, education and other important services from Washington to local communities.

Mosbacher said the program is important because it redefines essential services and what the government can and should be doing.

He is an attorney and member of the Texas Bar. He served for more than six years as a legislative assistant to U.S. Senate Republican Leader Howard Baker.

The current Democratic candidates:

Bob Krueger was selected the most effective "freshman" congressman in 1974 and was re-elected in 1976.

Because Texas has a tradition of keeping U.S. senators in office for lengthy amounts of time, Krueger says he believes voters should choose someone who has the integrity and experience to be a senator for a long time. He says he does not

think the decision should be made on the basis of one issue.

In 1978 Krueger ran for U.S. Senate and lost in a close race to Sen. John Tower. During 1979-1981 he was one of the ambassadors-at-large to Mexico.

Kent Hance is completing his third term in Congress, and was elected to be a state senator in 1974.

He says that effective leadership in Washington is an important qualification, and says he is qualified because he has held legislative political positions since 1974.

He says this shows he is an effective spokesman for the people he represents.

Hance has been a member of the House Ways and Means Committee since 1980, and is author of the Hance Tax Cut Bill.

Lloyd Doggett has served in the Senate for 10 years. He is author of more than 125 pieces of legislation that have become law.

One of the laws established was the Texas Human Rights Commission, passed this summer, which enforces laws of equal opportunities and rights.
