Kansas Attorney General Robert Stephan, the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, the Jewish Community Relations Bureau of Kansas City, Mo., and the Jewish War Veterans of the United States of America have filed informal objections to the license renewal.

A group calling itself Community Service Broadcasting Inc. has agreed to buy the station for \$350,000 once the license questions are resolved.
