The sham arrests and public humiliation were part of Gainesville's effort to kick off the Smokeout, a midnight-to-

make millions of smokers abstain Thursday.

Libby Barker, a Gainesville civic leader and organizer of the Smokeout effort, said Davis, Okla., residents Tom West and T.J. Clymer were stopped by a city policeman on Interstate 35. The pair were returning to Oklahoma from Dallas, but agreed to participate in the Smokeout activities

That involved being handcuffed, put in a cart drawn by two seventh annual Great American mules and paraded with a posse escort before hundreds of specmidnight exercise designed to tators, the high school band and

the mayor, who adopted the pair as part of a Smokeout scheme to provide support for puffers

"It worked out real good for said Barker. "They were real good sports and they're heading back to Oklahoma tonight. They say they'll try (to

In other activities in Gainesville, shootouts using blanks were staged downtown, with smokers "shot" by the sheriff and his deputies for refusing to give up their guns and their

But as the sun passed high noon, only four packs — one almost empty — had been depo-sited in the coffin.
