Radio auction will help girl

POWELL — A week-long auction on a local radio station raised thousands of dollars for a girl who needs a new kidney.

KPCQ-FM set aside much of its regular programming between 7:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. each day last week to complete the auction for 9-year-old Toreasa Scheeler, news director John Clayton said Saturday.

He said the amount of money raised should be known early this week, but will total several thousand dollars.

In August, Toreasa was diagnosed as having chronic kidney failure and has been undergoing dialysis. Clayton said Medicare will cover the cost of the operation at the University of Washington Hospital. But

neither Medicare nor insurance will cover post-operative costs estimated at \$75,000, he said.

Toreasa's mother, Zoe Meier, has undergone blood tests to see if she can donate one of her kidneys. Tests results should be available this week. If Meier is an acceptable donor, the operation can be performed in a few weeks.

The items donated to the auction included several autographed footballs from the Dallas Cowboys, Denver Broncos, Los Angeles Raiders, St. Louis Cardinals, Nebraska Corn Huskers and Wyoming Cowboys. Autographed baseballs came from the Oakland As and Joe DiMaggio.

The Utah Jazz donated a basketball.

Swedes stop computer smuggling

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — Swedish officials Sunday stopped shipment of a highly sophisticated American computer reported to be a missile guidance system being smuggled to the Soviet Union by a KGB agent in South Africa.

The Times of London reported the KGB was on the verge of "taking delivery of a complete American computerized missile guidance system supplied by the United States to South Africa and then secretly diverted."

The Times said the computer

was to have been shipped Sunday from Sweden to the Soviet Union.

A Swedish customs official said the shipment was "frozen" because no customs declaration was received with the equipment. U.S. Embassy officials refused comment on reports Sweden was asked to impound the shipment.

Carl-Johan Aaberg, permanent undersecretary of Sweden's Foreign Trade Ministry, said the computer was being guarded and remain in Sweden for at least "several days."

Three containers believed to

hold a VAX 11-782 computer made by the Digital Equipment Corp. arrived in the Swedish free port of Helsingborg last week from South Africa.

Part of the same shipment, containing another computer, was impounded by West German authorities in Hamburg last Monday.

The Times said U.S. and West German officials obtained a court order to seize only one of two computers in the shipment at Hamburg. Therefore, the second one got through to Sweden where it was to be sent on to the Soviet Union.

A customs official in the United States had said the VAX 11-782 could be used "for missile guidance or something like that" and "keeping track of troops and weapons."

The Times reported the deal was planned by a German-born KGB agent, Richard Mueller, a resident of Cape Town, South Africa.

Mueller controlled another agent named Commodore Dieter Gerhardt who, until his arrest last Jan. 26, was second-in-command at the South African Simonstown naval base, the Times said.

South African news reports said Sunday that two American special agents are in South Africa to investigate Mueller, who is believed to be wanted by U.S. authorities for questioning on the computer deal.

Other press reports say Mueller built a stockpile of sensitive U.S. and Western technology in Cape Town for transfer to the East Bloc.

Mueller, who moved to South Africa in 1980 and bought a lavish \$1.8 million Cape Town property, is "lying low" in Austria, said South Africa's commissioner of police.
