## Unemployment fell in October

United Press International AUSTIN — A general improve-

ment in the Texas economy and seasonal hiring to cope with the Christmas rush pushed October jobless rates down in nearly every metropolitan area of the state, state labor analysts reported Tuesday.

According to figures released by the Texas Employment Commission, Bryan-College Station once again reported the state's lowest jobless rate, 3.2 percent. Austin was close behind with a 3.6 percent rate.

Laredo, with an October jobless rate of 21.8 percent, continues to lead the state in unemployment. However, the rate there dropped nearly five percen-tage points from September's level of 26.4 percent.

Statewide, the 6.9 percent jobless rate recorded for October was the lowest in 17 months.

"Almost everywhere we saw a substantial drop," said Diane Dobie of the Texas Employment -Commission. "Every area had a decrease and 22 of them had a drop of a full point or more."

Christmas hiring was responsi-ble for part of the improvement,

she said, but more important was an overall upturn in the state's

'Statewide we are seeing an increase in most of the major indust-rial groups, including the oil and gas industry," she said. "We are encouraged by this and I think most of the areas of the state are holding their own and showing a little bit of growth.

October jobless rates for other areas of the state included:

establish his practice in Houston. Thomas resumed his trip to Butler after being treated at a hospital for the slash on his arm.





