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Hockey official threatens U.S.

TORONTO - Canada's chief international hockey nego-tiator fired the latest salvo in an escalating battle between the American and Canadian Olym-U.S. players may have to return their hockey gold medals won at the 1980 Olympics.

Alan Eagleson said the ever increasing possibility of a U.S. protest over the eligibility of three Canadian Olympians who may have signed NHL contracts was ludicrous, considering the American squad may have been guilty of the same practice four years ago.
"We have some information

that might indicate that some U.S. players had agreed to terms and to an NHL contract before the 1980 Olympics," he said. "That is a technical violation of the same type the U.S. is saying we have violated. If they did (agree to contracts), they may have to return the gold medals." Eagleson, who says the U.S.

team's goal is to weaken Canada for their opening game of the Olympic tournament, complained the Canadian squad has come under a lot of unfair scrutiny of late.
"If the true definition of

amateur were applied to the players from the other countries, you would wind up with no one being eligible," he said. "We're more pure than any team in the Olympics, other than the U.S.'
