Judge assigned to Chagra case

SAN ANTONIO — Jimmy Chagra, charged with conspiring to kill a federal prosecutor, Tuesday laughed in disbelief when told the case was randomly assigned to his old foe — U.S. Judge William Sessions.

Kearns, 44, was brought before O'Connor in a seperate hearing and charged with conspiracy and assaulting a federal prosecutor.

The indictments alleged that Chagra arranged through an associate, Robert Piccolo, to hire Kearns to kill Kerr, who was in-

vestigating Chagra's drug deal-

ing activities.

The indictment said Kearns fired "numerous rounds" from a semi-automatic, .30 caliber rifle at Kerr's car. Kerr escaped serious injury by ducking beneath the dashboard.

Chagra is serving his sentences at the federal prison in Marion, Ill., while Kearns is serving an 18-month sentence in Concord, N.H., for theft from

Father shows FBI agents location of child's grave

derer Keith Webb broke down and cried after he led FBI agents to his six-year-old son's shallow

grave in the desert. "There's Stevie," FBI agent David Beiter quoted Webb as saying in trial testimony before U.S. District Judge Harry Lee

Dr. William Liles, an Army pathologist who examined the boy's remains, testified Monday that the body Webb led agents to was that of Steven Marcel Wilson, and that homicide was the probable cause of death.

Beiter said he and another agent took custody of Webb at the Criminal Investigations Division office at Fort Bliss last Sept. 6.

Agents testified Webb led them to the site of the shallow grave, at a spot in the New Mexico desert, one mile north of the Texas line. They said they saw a portion of an uncovered skull of a human, then the rest of the decomposed remains of a child's

On the trip back to El Paso, Webb decided to talk to the agents about the circumstances surrounding the boy's death, Beiter said.

"Webb said that the boy had died about one month before, on Aug. 12, at the residence Webb shared with his wife, June Webb, located at Fort Bliss," the

'He told us that two or three days before the boy's death, the boy stole something, and to punish him, the boy was put in hot water," Beiter said. "Afterward, he put the boy in bed, and climbed into the bed to console

On the day the boy died, Beiter said Webb and the boy were EL PASO — Accused mur- in the house alone when Webb picked up the boy from his bed, where he was lying in a lethargic state, and carried him to the kitchen, where he gave the boy a cookie. The boy fell over dead, the agent quoted Webb as

> Webb told agents he wrapped the boy in a blanket, put him in a storage shed at the residence

and buried the body later in the week, Beiter said.

Acting as his own lawyer, Webb questioned Beiter as to why it took so long to present him before a magistrate. He said he was taken into police custody on Friday but was not taken before a magistrate until the next day and the criminal complaint against Webb and his wife, June, was not signed until two days later, Sept. 8.
