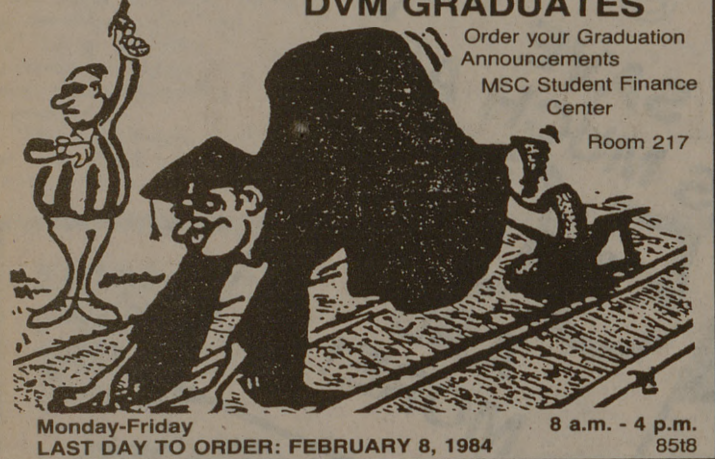

NEW ORLEANS — Just about 10 years have gone by since those whose travels brought them along the interstate from the western outskirts of town began realizing that there was going to be a permanent dent on the horizon.

That route still provides the best view for someone seeing it for the first time.

After driving along for mile after mile, past the airport, past the big cemetery and past the rail yards, the highway lunges upward, making a long, left-hand swing as it nears downtown.

And as the road reaches its highest point, the structure suddenly becomes visible. Now it is an everyday part of life. But a decade ago it was a novelty — a modern-day, bulky beanstalk growing skyward, promising riches and delivering controversy.

Domed stadiums of varying size and makeup have popped up here and there since Houston's Astrodome led the way.

But in the world of huge, covered arenas, it is the Louisiana Superdome that has consistently lured the biggest attractions and meant the most to the area in which it was built.

"I don't know what would have happened if the Dome had not been here," said Ed Nebel, director of the department of hotels, restaurants and tourism at the University of New Orleans.

"But I don't think there is any doubt that it was the catalyst for the change that was felt throughout the central business district."

What the Superdome has meant to New Orleans can best be demonstrated by a display of

perdome has done what proponents said it would do: has brought people to the Orleans and, in the most, it saved the downtown area from withering.

"I was one of the people who was opposed to the Superdome when it was first proposed," Kent McWilliams, chairman of the Louisiana Stadium and Convention District Commission, which acts as watchdog of the corporation that manages the building.

"But I was wrong. All I have to do is look around at the buildings, hotels and jobs to see that the stadium has been a success."

Despite the city's national reputation as a place to go and have fun, Nebel says tourism was a looked commodity before the stadium was built.

"Ten years ago," he says, "I believe it or not, you could not find any of the movers and shakers in this city who thought of tourism as an important factor in the economy."

"Today they are saying not only is tourism a major part of the economy, but that tourism has gotten to the point where it is something I understand. Now they feel tourism creates too many paying jobs and that we need more high-tech industries who doesn't?"

Dollars from tourism that flowed into the city at a rate that was double that of the gas industry and from the huge port and the flow of dollars is not likely to slow any time soon.

The Super Bowl return to New Orleans year after year — when the NCAA's Final Four has arguably become the Super Bowl of amateur sports in the United States, was a small part of the Superdome two years ago and will be back in 1987.

Stadium officials are using a proposal to the city which would call for three Final Four trips to the dome in the next dozen years.

The Superdome was booked 270 of the 365 days in 1983. It is booked every weekend of the year. Last November, for the first time ever, the Superdome surpassed \$1 million in receipts for a single month.

Everybody from the American Horse Show Association (which will show up in the Lions International Convention (which has time booked for 1986) has been lured by the facility.

Even the talk of a major league baseball franchise has been renewed.

"It used to be," said Ed Nebel, the stadium's vice president for marketing, "that the name among baseball people in New Orleans was not just 'hell, no,' but it was 'hell, no, hell, yes,' but it is not either. I think our chances for a baseball are better than they have been at any time in the 10 years."

Stadium officials believe the cost of the building will be paid by the end of the decade through a combination of increased parking revenues and by a hotel tax which has been in effect since the stadium was built.

But, somewhat surprisingly, no one has tried to put a price tag on just how much — in dollars — the stadium has meant to the community.

"As a matter of fact," Ed Nebel, "we are negotiating a contract to do an impact study to think an impact study will be a lot of positive things."

"But I think one big thing will show is what everybody sees. If anybody had ever seen that area before the stadium was built, they would have to see that the Dome was a prime mover in the development of the stadium and the (Mississippi) river."

"It showed that things would happen here and they have."




