Pennzoil desires federal injunction in oil merger

DENVER — Attorneys for ennzoil asked a federal ap-als court Monday to halt the roposed merger of Texaco askir nd Getty Oil Co., while Texaco tion. inued its plan to complete

Pennzoil attorney Jay Green-eld filed a motion in the 10th S. Circuit Court of Appeals king the court to issue a temprary injunction blocking the erger pending an emergency aring on the suit.

The appeals court, which re-eived the papers late in the ay, did not act immediately on
