# Elton John marries on Valentine's Day

SYDNEY, Australia — British pop singer Elton John married his West German girlfriend Tuesday in a St. Valentine's Day ceremony with hundreds of screaming fans standing in the rain outside the church.

The bride, Renate Blauel, 28, a sound engineer, wore her wedding gift from John — a heart-shaped pendant of 63 diamonds.

The traditional wedding march was drowned out by John's hit song "I want to kiss the bride," which was being played from a nearby house.

John, 36, wearing black trousers, a white tail coat, striped shirt with pink bow tie and a white straw hat with pink-and-yellow ribbons, arrived at St. Mark's Anglican church in the

exclusive harborside suburb of Darling Point.

He arrived 20 minutes early in the drizzling rain and dashed, smiling and waving, through the drenched crowd of about 1,500 well-wishers into the church.

Blauel arrived on time wearing a traditional full length lace hailsport gown with a short veil and her heart-shaped pendant.

Eighty guests attended the ceremony, including American tennis star John McEnroe and singer Olivia Newton-John.

Congratulations also poured in from John's colleagues in the entertainment world, including singers Michael Jackson and Rod Stewart.

John's friends said he was especially moved when his godson, Sean Lennon, the 9-year-

old son of slain singer John Lennon, wished him congratulations from New York during a telephone call from the ex-Beatle's widow, Yoko Ono.

Dozens of riot police manned wooden barriers surrounding the church to control the banner-waving fans, many of whom had waited for more than four hours. Some wore John's trademark oversize sunglasses.

The crowd listened to the wedding from loudspeakers and cheered when the couple emerged arm-in-arm after the 40-minute ceremony.

The British singer, born Reg Dwight, declared several years ago that he was bisexual, but Blauel said in an interview Sunday: "I've heard all sorts of stories about Elton and that he's supposed to be bisexual but that doesn't worry me," Sydney's Sunday Telegraph quoted her as saying.

## Kidnapped girl found unharmed

HOUSTON — A 7-year-old Humble girl kidnapped by a man on Sunday was found unharmed Tuesday, police said.

Veronica Martinez, a first grader, wandered up to a house north of Houston about 11:45 a.m. and the residents there called the Harris County Sheriff's Department. Officials said she did not appear to be harmed or abused.

Bonny and Virginia Martinez, the girl's parents, said they had been at a relative's home Sunday night near the Shady Lane Park in northeast Houston when a man in a big, white car drove up, opened the car door and grabbed the girl.

The child told officials the man put her in a vacant house, where she fell asleep. When she awoke, she wandered next door to the home where the people called authorities.

# Red River work delay criticized by senator

BOSSIER CITY, La. — A Louisiana senator who chastised federal officials for delaying work that would open the Red River to barge traffic encouraged backers of the project Tuesday to make it an issue in the presidential campaign.

"I suspect the presidential race is going to be a close presidential race," Sen. J. Bennett Johnston told reporters prior to speaking at the Red River Valley Association convention. "I would think the presidential candidates ought to be looking to please this area, and I think we ought to make it an issue in this race."

Johnston, ranking minority member of the Senate subcommittee on Energy and Water Development, last week accused the Army Corps of Engineers of delaying work on the project. He said Tuesday the blame apparently should be placed with the federal Office of Management and Budget.

The OMB mandated "level funding" for the project — delaying construction in order to spread out cost, Johnston said. But the senator said it would be better to complete an entire series of locks and dams in project so its financial benefits could be realized.

"We get no benefit at all from navigation on this end of the river until we complete them all," he said. "We're not saving money by stretching out the project."

The first of five locks and dams on the river virtually is complete and construction is underway on the second. But work on the third through fifth locks and dams has been delayed, Johnston said. The democrat said he would push for work on the three remaining locks and dams to occur simultaneously.

The proposed 1985 budget earmarked \$81.6 million for the project, which eventually would open the river to commercial barge traffic from the Mississippi River in central

Louisiana north to Arkansas and Oklahoma.

Work on the lock and dam system is not expected to be completed until 1994, though Johnston said he hoped to change that to 1991. Earlier Tuesday, two congressmen blamed the Red River administration and was spending for delaying the year-old project.

Rep. Wes Watkins, Okla., blasted Reagan's policy of requiring greater up-front financial commitments to local governments for projects. Watkins told the administration delegates the project was designed to shut down water development in the country, including the Red River Waterway project.

"I hope the policy of administration will change," Watkins said. "It's a policy divide and conquer. It's a policy of the haves against the have-nots."

"I will not vote for a program to divide this valley. We're going to have to come together and unite together and build it."

Stubbs called the licensing program a "decision by the administration" that has nothing to do with whether it's right or wrong.

"Basically, they're (the plaintiffs) trying to make us out as stealing from people who love the school," she said. "We own the marks. The Secretary of State issued certificates of registration because we showed proof."

Al Myers, owner of M&M Designs, said he refused to sign a licensing agreement because most of the designs were used long before the licensing program was established.

"If you don't design it, it's not yours," he said.

But Stubbs said, "We assert that we had the right to the

symbols in 1929, and we have it in 1984."

She said the licensing program was established at Texas A&M three years ago so that the marks would not be used in "inappropriate ways."

Stubbs also said that the Texas A&M Bookstore in the Memorial Student Center, which stocks items from manufacturers who have paid the licensing royalty, does not even have a competitive edge over the off-campus book stores because the wholesale purchase prices for the items are the same. Manufacturers who sell items to the MSC Bookstore are not given a price break because they signed the license agreement.

"That means our prices will stay competitive and not under-

cut the other book stores."

John Raney, owner and manager of the Texas Aggie Store, said that although the issue is an emotional one for plaintiffs, it is also a legal

"People who support shouldn't have to pay a tax to wear school symbols," he said, "especially since Aggie is owned by the people of the state of Texas."

"We feel like those who belong to the students and public, not to any one institution, either the system or Texas Aggie Bookstore."

He said, "We feel like students are the real winners in this case."

## Stolen clothes found

LAKE CHARLES, La. — Authorities Tuesday said more than half of \$300 worth of clothing and accessories stolen last fall from a Charles store has surfaced in a Houston warehouse.

Sheriff's Deputy John Doyle said authorities believe they had a multistate burglary with the discovery of 60 pieces of merchandise stolen from tanners Young Fashion's store.

Doyle said authorities believe the ring also was responsible for a \$2 million burglary in St. Louis. Details were available of the northeast Louisiana burglary and the other burglaries authorities believe are related.

Doyle said charges probably would be filed within the next week against two or three suspects, who he would not name.

Doyle said the Lake Charles merchandise was discovered by Corpus Christi police this week when they came upon a burglary in progress and pursued it.

He said the suspects got away but the abandoned warehouse evidence that led them to the discount clothing store warehouse in Houston, where the Lake Charles merchandise was found.

Doyle said Texas authorities contacted deputies in Lake Charles, who went to Houston to identify the merchandise, which was being held by BI as evidence.
