

Lewis jumps long, high without drugs

NEW YORK — A determined Carl Lewis, looking to show the world he doesn't need the aid of drugs to get high or heads the long jump field today as the 1984 indoor track and field season reaches its climax with the U.S. National Championships.

The event is the final meet in the \$150,000 Grand Prix series sponsored by Mobil.

Lewis originally planned to skip this meet as it did not fit into his rigid Olympic training schedule. But the world indoor record-holder in the long jump (8 feet 10 1/4 inches) decided he had something to prove.

Lewis was the subject of published reports in an Oslo, Norway newspaper last August that tested positive for testosterone, a drug banned by the International Amateur Athletic Federation, at the World Track and Field Championships in Helsinki where he won three gold medals.

The IAAF denied the story, after the drug scandal at the American Games two weeks later embarrassed Ameri-

can officials, it was decided to have mandatory testing at all national championship meets. Thus, Lewis thinks his participation in the indoor meet will erase any doubts about his ability.

"I hope this will put those stories to rest," Lewis said.

"Early in the indoor season I indicated I might not participate in the Indoor Championships. My indoor schedule, with the Olympics paramount, was to be a limited one. Inasmuch as I did not see myself being a factor in the Grand Prix overall competition, I thought perhaps

I would forego the National Championships this one year.

The world indoor record-holder in the long jump (8 feet 10 1/4 inches) decided he had something to prove.

"However, my condition and preparation are excellent, so I have decided to participate. Af-

ter all, I won both the long jump and the 60-yard dash last year, and the long jump in 1982."

When Lewis won last year's 60, edging Ron Brown, he became only the second athlete in the Championships' history to double in the 60 and the long jump; only Barney Ewell, who pulled it off in 1945, had ever done so before.

But this year there is good reason for Lewis not to attempt a double. For one thing, his supremacy in the sprints is in doubt after a poor season. Brown beat him in San Diego last week, and he lost to some-


ever came to controlling the game.
