Lucas pleading insanity

 GEORGETOWN — An attorney for confessed mass murderer Henry Lee Lucas says "the one-eyed drifter" will plead insanity at his trial next month for the 1979 death of an unidentified hitchhiker.
 Georgetown attorney Don Higginbotham said that although several state witnesses had found Lucas competent to stand trial on two previous charges, an unidentified psychiatrist had found otherwise.
 Higginbotham filed papers Tuesday in District Judge John Carter's court saying he had evidence that would prove Lucas' mental incompetence.

The trial marks the first first capital murder charge faced by Lucas.

Agency veteran says CIA works 'illegally' in the U.S.

The Central Intelligence Agency is not based on intelligence, a 25-year veteran of the agency said Tuesday night.

Ralph McGehee quoted a former CIA director as saying, "You can't rely on my people for intelligence — they are biased, action-oriented people."

McGehee discussed discrepancies in the agency's actions and his disenchantment with his former employer.

McGehee told a crowd of about 100 in Rudder Theater that two of the main functions of the CIA are misinformation operations and actions to overthrow Communist governments in foreign countries.

Fourteen of McGehee's 25 years with the agency were spent overseas. He spent six years in Thailand, where he discovered extensive Communist involvement through such organizations as the "Farmer's Liberation Association" and youth organizations. He said the agency refused to acknowledge his findings of the huge Communist involvement in Thailand.

McGehee was labeled a dissident by headquarters and told he did not have a chance to gain further promotions in the agency.

"They wanted to get rid of me," he said, "and I wanted to get out."

He was assigned a position in the International Communica-

tions Branch. While he wrote a report on Vietnam communism. He used to have compiled while in Vietnam and verified findings with books from Communist leaders, among them Tse Tung. However, the agency again did not acknowledge the information presented.

McGehee entered the during the McCarthy era said he was "extremely" to fight communism — "I was a real company," he said.

He changed his opinion repeatedly trying to suppress information and being told his career was jeopardized by his behavior.

Candidate offering bus system to get students to vote absentee

Richard Smith is making it easy on voters.

Not going to be in town for the special election March 10? Vote absentee.

No way to get to the absentee polls? Take Richard Smith's private bus.

Smith, the Republican candi-

date for the district 14 state representative's seat, is personally financing a shuttle system to run from the Texas A&M campus to the College Station City Hall, where absentee voting is going on until March 6.

The shuttle service doesn't violate any election rules. No campaigning is taking place on the bus.

Neeley Lewis, Smith's Democratic opponent, is comfortable with Smith's latest project.

"Anything to get people out to the polls," Lewis said.

Coordinated with the Texas A&M College Republicans group, Smith is supplying his realty company's bus, driven by student volunteers, to take students to vote.

The drivers must have either a chauffeur's license or be licensed to drive the University shuttle buses, Smith's campaign manager Sarilee Ferguson said.

The bus will pick up students

at the Commons area Memorial Student Center every two hours between 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. and at Dining Hall each morning afternoon on weekdays March 6, when absentee for the election closes.

Ferguson said this is another effort to get students to vote.

Special arrangements made to have absentee placed in College Station mostly for the convenience of Texas A&M students because the election will be held at the University's spring vacation. Because an absentee could not be placed on campus, Smith is sponsoring the bus so students who don't have a way of getting to city hall are able to vote.


