Gemayel meets with papal envoy

BEIRUT — Fighting between Moslem and Christian factions killed one person and wounded 14 others Wednesday as President Amin Gemayel met a Vatican envoy who expressed the pope's "deep desire for Lebanon's unity."

The sporadic clashes did not disrupt planning for the scheduled resumption of reconciliation talks among the warring factions Monday in Switzerland.

Archbishop Mario Brini met with Gemayel at the presidential palace in the east Beirut suburb of Baabda and conveyed a message of support from Pope John Paul II.

"I have delivered a message to the president from the holy pope, expressing his deep desire for Lebanon's unity," Brini told reporters after his talks with the embattled Maronite Christian president.

Brini, 75, former secretary of the Vatican's Sacred Congregation for Eastern Rite Churches, planned to fly to Damascus Thursday to deliver a message to Syrian President Hafez Assad, who backs the Moslem insurgents fighting for more political power in Lebanon.

Saudi Arabian mediator Rafik Hariri also arrived for talks with Gemayel and Foreign Minister Elie Salem. No details of

the discussions were disclosed.

Scattered fighting rattled the "green line" dividing Christian east and Moslem west Beirut, with Moslem militiamen trading machine gun and rocket-grenade fire with government troops.

Archbishop Mario Brini met with Gemayel at the presidential palace in the east Beirut suburb of Baabda and conveyed a message of support from Pope John Paul II.

Clashes also were reported in the hills east of the capital.

Police sources said a shell exploded in the once-fashionable Mazraa area of west Beirut, killing one person and wounding four. A security official blamed the fighting on rival Moslem gunner.

Three shells, apparently fired from the Druze Moslem-controlled Shouf mountains southeast of Beirut, also crashed into an Armenian neighborhood in the Christian sector.

Police and hospital sources

said the fighting wounded at least 12 people in west Beirut and two others on the east side.

The fighting defied a truce in effect since Gemayel's abrogation Monday of the May 17, 1983, troop withdrawal accord with Israel, but coincided with preparations for a second round of peace talks in Lausanne, Switzerland.

The first round of national reconciliation talks ended Nov. 4 and achieved little in efforts to stop nine years of sectarian strife.

After receiving Gemayel's invitation to join the new talks, eight leaders of Lebanon's splintered political and religious communities began preparing their arguments.

Former President Camille Chamoun, who represents the all-Christian Lebanese Front with Gemayel's father, Pierre, head of the Christian Phalange, said he would bring up at least 30 points in the talks at the luxury Beau Rivage hotel on Lake

Geneva.

Rebel Moslem leaders said they had two goals — a greater share of power in the Christian-dominated government and fixing the blame for the army's killing of about 300 people in Moslem slums and villages in

early February.

Lebanon's 1943 Constitution gave Christians a 6-to-5 edge over Moslems in parliament, but Moslems now make up about 60 percent of the country's estimated 4 million residents.

2 bus companies take over routes

AUSTIN — The Texas Railroad Commission said Wednesday two bus companies will provide temporary service to 12 communities between Houston and San Antonio that are being dropped by Greyhound Bus Lines Inc.

Kerrville Bus Co. of Kerrville and River City Coaches of San Antonio will transport passengers, baggage and small packages along the Houston-San Antonio route.

Commission chairman Mack Wallace said the state regulatory agency will determine later which bus service will receive the permanent license for the route.

Cities that will be served by the new bus service are Kingsbury, Harwood, Belmont, Gonzales, Waelder, Flatonia, Engle, Weimar, Glidden, Alleyton, Eagle Lake and East Bernard.

The Railroad Commission had earlier denied Greyhound's request to discontinue service to 38 small Texas towns. But Greyhound overturned the commission's ruling in an appeal to the federal Interstate Commerce Commission.

The commission lost an appeal of the ICC decision earlier this week before the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans.

Greyhound dropped service to 26 Texas towns last Dec. 12.
