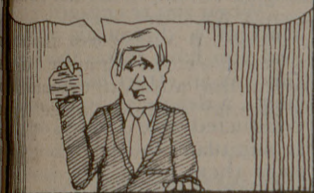

Teacher pay raises supported

Candidates differ on goals

The six candidates seeking the two open spots on the College Station School Board seem to agree on one thing: teachers in the district need a pay raise. However, they have differing opinions on how to accomplish this and several other of the school board's goals.

All of the candidates support vocational and distributive education programs and all seem to support the ideas of Superintendent H.R. Burnett, whose job was the subject of some controversy at a few of the board meetings earlier this year.

College Station schools are becoming more and more challenging to the student and all candidates seem to be in favor of such a system.

Running for Place 6 on the board, which will be open due to the resignation of President Bruce Robeck's resignation, are Vernon Files, Tony Jones and Jim Raatz.

Running for Place 7, which has been vacant since last sum-

mer when Bill Wasson resigned, are Gerald Bratton, James Luscombe and Robert Stallings.

For Place 6:  
• Vernon Files has the advantage of being a retired school teacher. His main job, he says, will be to try to see things through the eyes of area residents.

• Tony Jones has more political experience than his two opponents. He served four years on the College Station City Council and one year on the Planning and Zoning Commission. Jones owns a local construction business and says he has been very influential in bringing large industry to the area. He says it will be tax revenues that industries, such as Westinghouse, bring to the area that will facilitate a teacher pay raise.

• Jim Raatz, a graphics designer in Texas A&M's Engineering Experiment Station, is one of three University employees seeking office. One of Raatz' proposals is a call-in radio talk show to allow board members to

answer questions from citizens.

For Place 7:

• Gerald Bratton, head of the veterinary anatomy department at Texas A&M, says his first priority is to put all matters of running the schools in the superintendent's hands.

• James Luscombe, vice president of ARC Automation Services, has spent five years on

tax boards and says he has the experience to stand up to taxpayers who will want to fight against a tax raise to support teachers' salaries.

• Robert Stallings, business manager of the agricultural economics department at Texas A&M, says being an accountant is his main qualification for the job.

Two bodies recovered from Gulf

CAMERON, La. — Rescue workers Thursday recovered the bodies of two Marathon Oil Co. employees from the Gulf of Mexico and searched for two others missing in the crash of a helicopter that broke up in the air after leaving an oil rig.

The chopper, owned by Petroleum Helicopters Inc., plummeted into the Gulf about 6:40 a.m. Wednesday as several workers on the offshore drilling platform watched.

A Coast Guard rescue ship recovered a seat cushion and debris from the helicopter Thursday near the site of the crash, about 80 to 90 miles south-southwest of Cameron.

The body of Michael G. Sinton, 37, of Lafayette, was recovered at dusk Wednesday by rescue workers, who Thursday morning discovered the body of Margaret A. Singletary, 30, of Milan, Texas.

Officials continued to search for Marathon employee John H. Turner, 44, of Rayne, and pilot William A. Bruce, 51, of Lafayette, an employee of PHI.

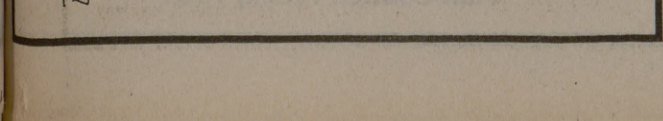
However, it is important to continue in the faith and hope of Easter all year round.

Voters in the City of College Station will elect a mayor, three councilmen and two School Board trustees in the city election on Saturday, April 7. Mayor Gary Halter will be running for his fourth term as mayor unopposed.

Running for City Council Place 2 is incumbent Robert C. Runnels. Rick Pustejovsky will

also be on the ballot, but he has withdrawn from the race. Runnels, an assistant professor of meteorology at Texas A&M has served on the council for four years.
