


Funeral services for Michele Neckar, 21, will be held at 10 a.m. today at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Waco. Neckar was a student working on her mas-ter's degree in land economics and real estate.

The accident occurred about p.m. Saturday when the eastbound car driven by Ziemer and Neckar's westbound car collided on Texas 105 one mile south of Plantersville, said a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Three other Texas A&M students, who were passengers in Neckar's car, were injured.
