# Jones sworn in as trustee, Robeck resigns

In a special meeting Monday night, Tony Jones, winner of Place 6 in Saturday's election, was sworn in as a member of the College Station Independent School District Board of Trustees.

Jones is a former city coun-

cilman for the City of College Station.

The appointment for Place 7 is pending a run-off election between Robert Stallings and Gerald Bratton April 28.

Bruce W. Robeck, president of the board, officially resigned Monday night. He had announced his resignation in Jan-

uary. Robeck served two terms as president during nine years on the school board.

The board unanimously approved to postpone the appointment of a new president until after the results of the run-off election.

After a presentation by Dr. Michael Owens, director of cur-

riculum and instruction, the board approved an application to the Governor's Office of General Council and Criminal Justice for a grant of \$23,171 to support the Alternative Educational Classroom. A request for a secondary grant for \$14,850 to support the program also was approved by the board.

The Alternative Classroom plan allows students with disciplinary problems to attend classes in a structured environment away from the main campus. The alternative classroom series is in its second year in the CSISD.

Other items on the agenda included:

- Approval of minutes from the March 26 and April 3 meetings.
- The results of the canvass returns from Saturday's election results.
- Approval of serial numbers issued on the ballots.

## Newborn dumped by mother

LA MARQUE — A newborn girl found abandoned in a ditch was in guarded condition and suffering from exposure Monday, hospital officials said.

A citizen attracted by the infant's cries found the child, which was only a few hours old, at 7:35 a.m. Monday in a ditch on FM Road 2004 in La Marque, about 30 miles south of Houston, police said.

"She still had the placenta on her," a police dispatcher said.

The baby, which was sunburned, was placed in the custody of child welfare department while police tried to locate her mother. She was listed in guarded condition at Memorial Hospital of Galveston County in nearby Texas City.

Police asked citizens for information on the baby's mother.

"We would like any information anybody could give us," the police spokeswoman said. "There's not that much to go on right now."
