Schroeder's case was reviewed at several levels from the U.S. department of Justice to the Army Inspector General. The colonel reviewing the case did not recommend a court martial because he believed Schroeder did not personally gain from his actions. The reviewer ruled Schroeder apparently believed he was acting in the best interests of the Army.
