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Hart feels confident he will dominate Texas caucuses

TYLER — Democratic presi-  
dential candidate Gary Hart  
promised Texans Thursday he  
would make education his top  
priority and urged them to be-  
ware of military weapons con-  
tractors who he said pick tax-  
payers' pockets.

The Colorado senator,  
hoarse from his whirlwind four-  
city speaking tour of Texas, was  
greeted by about 300 people at  
the Broadway Square in the east  
Texas city. Hart is after the sup-  
port of Texas' 200 delegates for  
the May 5 precinct caucuses.  
Hart spoke for about seven

minutes during his brief stop-  
over.  
"We must have the courage  
to say 'No' to big national de-  
fense weapons contractors that  
don't make this country strong-  
er," Hart said, attacking Rea-  
gan's defense policies. "They  
only pick the pockets of the tax-  
payers."

Hart said Mondale's policies  
would lead the nation back to  
the past.  
"We cannot afford the poli-  
cies and special interests of  
Mondale going back to the  
1950s," he said. "The leader of  
this country must have the  
courage not to bow to powerful  
(lobbyists) that want the govern-  
ment to bail out mismanaged

companies with taxpayer dol-  
lars ... We cannot continue to  
slide into the past."  
Promising to give top priority  
to education, Hart said: "This  
contest is not between Walter  
Mondale and Gary Hart but be-  
tween the future of the Demo-  
cratic Party and the past of the  
Democratic Party and the presi-  
dential election is not just be-  
tween Ronald Reagan and a  
Democratic candidate but be-  
tween America's future and  
America's past."

Hart had breakfast with Gov.  
Mark White at the governor's  
mansion. White has said he  
does not plan to endorse a  
Democratic candidate.  
In Tyler, Hart repeated his

earlier warning against econ-  
omics.  
"This country and the world  
cannot stand a costly, dang-  
erous, unnecessary nuclear  
race and it must be ended,"  
said.

Hart said he expects to use  
the money for his education  
programs by canceling the B-1  
missiles and the B-1 bomber  
top items on the Reagan gov-  
ernment agenda for the coun-  
try's defense.

During his stops, he  
boasted of his "perfect record  
on civil rights and discrimi-  
nation." Mondale's claim that the  
vice president has the support  
of Hispanic voters.

"It's not a simple question of  
security and burden share," he  
said. The U.S. and Western Eu-  
rope have different perceptions  
of detente, primarily because  
the Western European nations  
believe a war would be con-  
ducted on their home turf.  
In addition, he said, it would  
be next to impossible to choose  
a European as Supreme Allied  
Commander.  
"Can you imagine the para-  
noia in Scandinavia if a West  
German were chosen Supreme  
Commander?" he asked.

Haig said Kissinger was tak-  
ing the wrong approach to  
Western European diplomacy.  
"Style, tactics has a great deal  
to do with it," he said. "It's been  
my experience that you get  
more with honey than with vi-  
negar. Henry's using vinegar."  
"I would recognize that  
Americans have a responsibility  
as well as the Europeans. I  
wouldn't further aggravate the  
situation with security prob-  
lems."  
But Haig and Kissinger said a  
nuclear war isn't imminent.  
"I don't think there is a  
greater danger of nuclear war  
than there was five years ago or

ten years ago," Kissinger  
said. He added that arms con-  
trol agreements were not likely  
either increase or decrease  
possibility.  
"Arms control by itself can-  
not control these tensions. Ar-  
ms control is becoming a cop-out  
which everyone can solve  
own dilemmas," Kissinger  
said. "Unless we manage to begin  
political dialogue, the tensions  
will continue."  
Haig, although a firm  
believer in Reagan's strong  
defense attitudes, criticized the  
administration — or rather  
administrative staff — for fail-  
ure to allow all options to be  
explored before the president.

The presidency is a learn-  
ing process, he said, but unfor-  
tunately, Reagan's staff isn't ex-  
perienced enough in foreign  
policy to teach him.  
True to form, the diplo-  
mat ended on an optimistic note.  
"When one discusses prob-  
lems in foreign policy," Kiss-  
inger said, "inevitably, one is  
concerned with the differences.  
But if one looks at the total  
one has to come to the conclu-  
sion that we and our associa-  
tes are able to solve every prob-  
lem we've described here."

"Every great achievement  
was a dream before it became  
reality."  
"It is our generation's  
opportunity to bring about a  
new order under the heavens."
