Ranger rally sinks Sox 7-4

 BOSTON — Reliever Mark Clear walked pinch hitter Bobby Jones with the bases loaded to trigger a three-run ninth inning that gave the Texas Rangers a 7-4 victory over Boston Thursday. It was the Red Sox seventh straight loss.

Billy Sample followed with a single off the wall in left field to drive in the second run and George Wright's infield out drove in the third run off loser Dennis Boyd, 0-2. Odell Jones, 1-0, picked up the victory in relief.

Texas scored four runs in the fifth to tie the score at 4-4. Buddy Bell led off with a dou-

ble to left, and after Larry Parrish drew a walk, Peter O'Brien lined a single to center, scoring Bell. Ned Yost blooped a single to left, scoring Parrish, and Wayne Tolleson followed with a sacrifice bunt that pitcher Boyd fielded and threw past Jerry Remy as O'Brien scored. Yost scored the final run on Curtis Wilkerson's groundout to second.

Tony Armas hit a pair of homers for Boston. His first blast came in the second with nobody on and Reid Nichols doubled one out later, moved to third on a wild pitch by knuckleballer Charlie Hough and scored on a passed ball by catcher Ned Yost.

In the third, Dwight Evans and Wade Boggs hit back-to-

back doubles to give Boston a 3-0 lead. Armas led off the fourth inning with his second homer of the game. In other action, Hubie Brooks' third home run of the season, a two-run shot in the eighth inning Thursday, rallied the New York Mets to a 7-6 victory over the Montreal Expos.

Jesse Orosco, 1-0, the Mets' third pitcher. Brooks' homer came after a one-out walk to Mookie Wilson and erased a 6-5 lead the Expos had taken in the seventh on Gary Carter's two-run homer. New York took an early 5-0 lead. Wally Backman led off the first with a single and stole second. After Ron Gardenhire struck out, Keith Hernandez walked and George Foster sin-

gled to score Backman and Hernandez to second. Carter then committed passed ball, sending the runners to second and third. Darryl Strawberry scored his eighth of them with a double.

In the second, a two-out error by second baseman Little allowed Backman to safely. Gardenhire then singled to second and when one fielder Tim Raines allowed a ball to go through his legs on an error, Backman scored. Foster's third home run of the season, in the third, boosted New York's lead to 3-0. Dwight Gooden, bidding his second major league victory started for New York and went four innings, striking out seven.

Islander's depth coming through

 New York Islanders general manager Bill Torrey has done his job, and as a result his team is halfway to its fifth straight Stanley Cup championship.

The Islanders eliminated Washington in five games and now have a chance to recover from their various injuries while Montreal and Quebec battle for the right to meet the champions in the semifinals. "It doesn't surprise me that our depth has come through," said Torrey. "It was my job to make sure it was there and I did it. I never thought that (rookies Pat) LaFontaine and (Pat) Flatley wouldn't help."

The Islanders closed out Washington without their captain Denis Potvin and three other regulars. They are receiving stellar goaltending from Billy Smith, who right now looks like a possibility to repeat as Conn Smythe Trophy winner. The power play looks like ready to explode. And the depth — Anders Kallur and Gord Lane in particular — has produced. While LaFontaine has looked spectacular in spots, Flatley has played the real playoff hockey, doing the work in the corners, getting key goals, and doing things like screening goalkeepers. Were it not for the brilliance of Smith, Flatley would be a candidate for the Conn Smythe. He may be anyhow. "The name of this team is hard work," Flatley said. "I thought we worked hard in Team Canada and we did. But this is something extra. Hard work is what gets it done."

Right now Montreal leads the Battle of Quebec 3-2 with Game 6 scheduled for the Montreal Forum Friday night. Though the Canadiens do not compare with the Islanders on paper, how intriguing it would be to see Montreal emerge as a possible barrier to the Islanders winning five straight Stanley Cups and thus tie the record of the 1956-60 Canadiens. "I don't care who we play Montreal or Quebec," said Torrey. "I guess it would be more appealing to the media if it was Montreal because of the tradition. But Quebec presents special problems because of its unusual offense."

Also on Friday night, Minnesota will be at St. Louis and Edmonton at Calgary in division finals. The Canadiens' success is due to goaltender Steve Penney. Penney extended his astonishing domination of the playoff net Wednesday night, kicking out 26 shots to pass Montreal to a 3-2 lead in the best-of-seven series. "Again the guy that came up big for us was Steve Penney," said Montreal defenseman Larry Robinson. "He stopped them every time he had the chance to."

It took 10 playoff games and the first benching of his NHL career for Steve Payne of the Minnesota North Stars to live up to his post-season nickname — "Mr. April."

Payne scored the first goal of the game and Don Beaupre registered his first NHL shut-out to lead Minnesota to a 6-0 drubbing of the St. Louis Blues, giving the North Stars a 3-2 lead in the Norris Division finals. Payne has scored more playoff goals than any player in North Stars' history. But he watched the third game of the series from the press box after failing to score in the first nine games of the playoffs.

"Sitting out helped," Payne said. "When you're in the game you don't realize you're playing poorly. When you get above, it's easier to see."
