U.S. Judge H.F. "Hippo" Garcia denied the stay without comment, clearing the way for De La Rosa to be executed by a

De La Rosa was sentenced to die for the Aug. 22, 1979, murder of store clerk Masoud Ghazali, 27, a former Iranian Air Force officer who was shot in the head in a robbery that netted only a six-pack of beer.

Defense attorney Rusty Guyer said he would file another appeal with the 5th U.S.

Circuit Court of Appeals.
