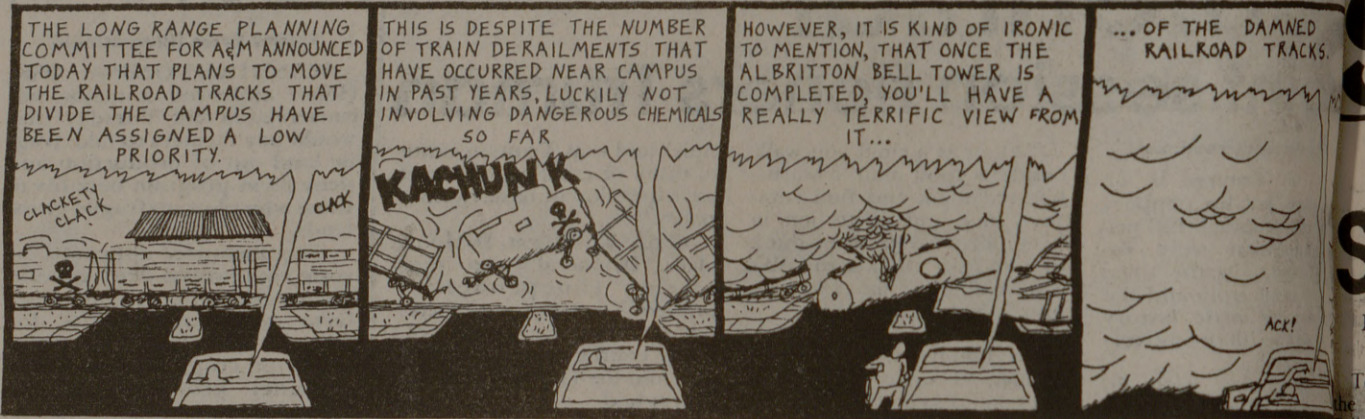

Nun cites religion in her defense

United Press International BROWNSVILLE — A Colorado social worker testified Tuesday her religious convictions prompted her to help transport two Salvadorans around Border Patrol checkpoints on Feb. 17.

Stacey Lynn Merkt, 29, a member of the Bijou House religious community in Colorado Springs, Colo., testified in her own defense to felony charges that could land her in prison up to 15 years upon conviction. "They would have been sent

(back) to El Salvador and they would have been killed," she said during an emotional question and answer session with her attorney, Daniel Sheehan of Washington, D.C.

Merkt said she was working as a volunteer at the Casa Oscar Romer refugee center operated by the Diocese of Brownsville at the time Salvadorans Mauricio Valle, 21, and Brenda Sanchez-Galan, 19, both of whom had worked in a Lutheran Church-sponsored medical program in El Salvador, asked her to take them to San Antonio to file applications for political asylum.

She told the federal jury she agreed because she had learned that the Lower Rio Grande Val-

ley district of the Immigration and Naturalization Service had begun arresting and deportation proceedings against any Salvadoran who appeared to ask for asylum.

"I'm certainly a Christian ... and I really do feel I know I have a legal right to help (Salvadorans) escape from oppression," she testified.

Merkt said the two Salvadorans had told her stories of alleged atrocities and killings carried out against their friends and family members in El Salvador — the same stories that the two sobbing Salvadorans had related to the jury the previous day.

Sheehan then began calling

immigration attorneys from Valley, from San Antonio, Houston in a bid to prove the INS district headquarters at nearby Harlingen, filed deportation proceedings against all Salvadorans seeking asylum, whereas the San Antonio, Houston and other district directors allowed asylum applications to be without incarcerating the Salvadorans.

A Catholic nun, Sister Anne Muhlenkamp, 36, of Poor Handmaids of the Christ of Fort Wayne, Ind., Dallas Times Herald reporter Jack Fischer, 30, were arrested when the Border Patrol arrested them.

"Speed is overwhelmingly important," said Mona Doyle, author of the consumer-oriented "Shoppers Report."

"The shopper today is more time poor than money poor," Doyle said.

The survey, commissioned by the nation's retail grocers, was released at the Food Marketing Institute convention in Dallas.

"Price is now only the third most important criterion," said Tim Hammonds, FMI's senior vice president.

Fast checkout ranked number one, followed by supermarket selection, variety and product selection. Researcher Doyle said she was not surprised by the findings, but cautioned that every survey has shortcomings.

"Surveys are often a measure of how consumers answer questions," she said. "More people, if asked, will tell you to read Time magazine than they will tell you to read Newsweek."

Doyle, although the truth may be the other way around. "Nevertheless, a number of studies bear out the consumer bias toward a speedy checkout," she said.

"What happens between the checker and consumer is important," she said. "A significant number of shoppers leave a store for weeks because one small happens at checkout."

Consumer preferences also encouraged stores to use some traditional practices. "Take the good old-fashioned paper bag," Doyle said. "A number of newer types of containers are available. But — the oldest thing in a supermarket — are speedy to unload, and speedy to unload, but not so speedy to load."

The Harris poll report says shoppers were willing to sacrifice for speed. "To save time shoppers report they most often packaged meats rather than for special cuts," Doyle said.

The practice of choosing store for its rapid checkout increased from 58 to 69 percent in the past three years, she indicated.

In addition, consumers worry a great deal about harmful chemicals. "The presence of residues such as pesticides and herbicides in food is considered a serious hazard by 77 percent of shoppers."

The poll found that nearly all shoppers feel products should carry cautionary labels if products are allegedly unsafe.
