Landry chooses Hogeboom as new Dallas quarterback

DALLAS — Tom Landry is as used to being around microphones and television cameras as most newscasters, but when he took center stage Tuesday he was obviously ill at ease.

It was decision time and the decision had not been an easy one.

"I would just as soon be on some lake fishing with (retired Minnesota coach) Bud Grant," said Landry. "This isn't any fun. This is not pleasant."

Landry went before the cameras Tuesday to announce he had decided Gary Hogeboom would start

the Dallas Cowboys' season opening game instead of veteran Danny White.

Normally Landry's mid-week meeting with the media is held in a motel next door to the Cowboys' corporate headquarters. Tuesday, however, the National Football League's Alumni Association threw a luncheon for present and past members of the team, so the news conference was moved to a large, downtown hotel.

The room was packed, the lights were bright and new team owner H.R. "Bum" Bright even stood in a back corner to listen to what the

coach had to say. Landry promptly got off to a bad start.

Before getting to the quarterback decision, Landry mentioned that offensive tackle Phil Pozderac would replace the injured Howard Richards in the starting lineup for the season opener against the Los Angeles Rams. Then he said:

"Now on the quarterback, which I know you are all interested in, I have decided to go with Pozderac as the starter, I mean Hogeboom."

But Landry did not pronounce Hogeboom's name right. Ever since Hogeboom became a member of the Cowboys, Landry has tended to add

an "n" to the middle syllable of the quarterback's name so that it came out "Hogenboom."

Hogeboom has long since become familiar with Landry's inability to pronounce his name right.

"My second year here," said Hogeboom, "coach Landry told us he was mispronouncing anybody's name that they should come and tell him. Well after he pronounced that way about 100 times I finally decided I would mention it."

"He told me, 'When you get to be a starter, I'll pronounce it right. That's all right. I've been called worse.'"

Moore has Raiders optimistic

LUBBOCK, Texas — Texas Tech football coach Jerry Moore Tuesday said the hiring of five new coaches promised an optimistic season for the Red Raiders — a team whose last winning season was 1978.

"We're just kind of on the verge of feeling like we're going to get good," Moore said of his team. "I've got as good a coaching staff as there is around. The biggest difference for us (the coaching staff) is the maturity level."

Only two of Moore's nine assistant coaches are working the same posts they had one year ago.

The five new coaches include offensive coordinator and quarterback coach Tom Wilson; defensive coordinator and linebacker coach Spike Dykes, offensive line coach Clovis Hale, defensive ends coach Dick Winder and secondary coach Carlos Mainord.

The Raiders were tied for first place in the Southwest Conference for the first half of last season, but ended 3-7-1 for the year with a narrow miss at tying for third place in the league.

Another plus for Moore is that Tech opens at home this year for the first time in his three years with the Raiders. They meet UT-Arlington on Sept. 15.

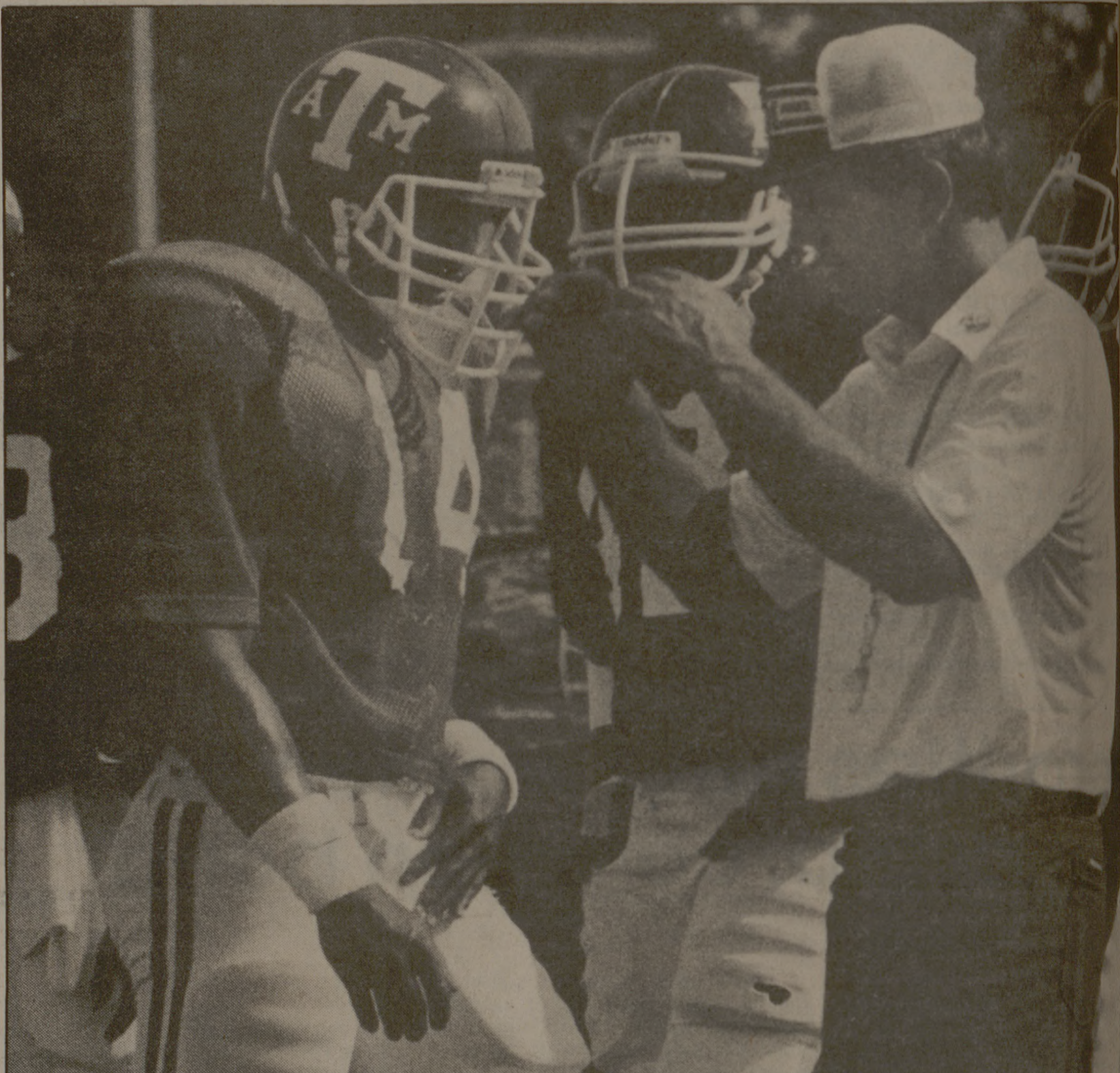
"I probably think the strength of our football team might be our defense," Moore said, adding his fall squad includes 27 seniors and 15 fourth-year juniors.

"Offensively we're going to stay about the same. We're probably break the I (formation) more than we have in the past," Moore said.

Moore said he hoped the Red Raiders' could improve their throwing game, but added the alternate quarterback situation remained uncertain. He said starting quarterback senior Perry Morren of Childress was a good leader.

"He is not an outstanding runner and he is not an outstanding passer. His strong point is his knowledge," Moore said.

Individual players on this season's Red Raiders' offensive line average only about 235 pounds, but Moore said he was not worried about their size because he was after speed.

Oilers make final roster cuts

HOUSTON — The Houston Oilers Tuesday announced the remainder of their roster cuts, which included four veterans and three rookies.

The Oilers Monday announced veteran free safety Mike Reinfeldt and offensive tackle Mo Towns were being released to comply with the NFL's limit of 49 players.

Included in the cuts announced Tuesday were Bill Kay, a four-year veteran defensive back from Pur-

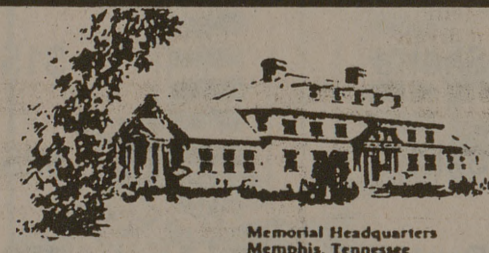
due; Greg Hill, a two-year defensive back from Oklahoma State; Stan Edwards, a three-year running back from Michigan, and Walt Arnold, a five-year tight end from New Mexico.

The moves left the Oilers with 48 players on their active roster, one below the league maximum. Officials declined to speculate how the last position will be filled, but it is likely being kept open in the event negotiations with running back Mike Rozier are successful.

Rozier, currently under contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers of the U.S. Football League, was selected in a supplemental NFL draft by Houston.

Oilers general manager Les Herzog has been conducting negotiations with Rozier's agent, Art Wilkinson, to try to bring the Heisman Trophy winner to Nebraska to the Oilers this season.

Herzog said Wednesday is the deadline for making a deal with Rozier for this season.

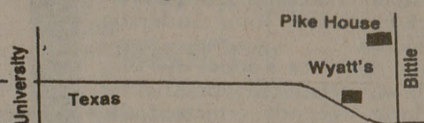
