Pentagon rejects T.I.'s semi-conductors

United Press International WASHINGTON — The Defense Department Monday rejected military equipment containing suspected faulty microcircuits that may have been installed in thousands of weapons and gear parts used by all branches of the armed forces, the Pentagon said.

The semi-conductors — tiny silicon chips that are used in everything from stereo equipment to aircraft carriers — were produced by the Texas Instruments Corp. of Midland and were suspected of being faulty when testing irregularities were uncovered by the company, the Pentagon said.

Up to 4,700 separate kinds of microcircuits are involved but it is not yet known how many of the devices have been installed in weapons and other military gear, said John Goldsmith, a spokesman for the Defense Logistics Agency.

The agency said no lives have been lost and no aircraft or other equipment destroyed because of part failure.

"These (semi-conductors) are in many parts and equipment," Goldsmith said in a telephone interview. "This stuff is so universally used now. We don't know how many (parts) are involved."

He said an earlier review of 546 devices used by IBM "resulted in an estimate of 15 million involved parts over a period of about eight years."

T.I. is providing the Pentagon with a list of up to 80 defense contractors who have ordered the microcircuits from T.I. for use in weapons parts and other military equipment, Goldsmith said.

T.I., which produces home computers and calculators for the commercial market, discovered the problem following a complaint by the IBM Corp. of Oswego, N.Y., the Defense Logistics Agency said.

T.I.'s investigation of the problem "revealed a more extensive problem which affected all of their 80-plus customers," the agency said in a

background papers.

The company informed the Defense Logistics Agency of the problem Sept. 6, and the agency's representatives at the defense plants Monday.

"It's terribly complicated," Norman Neureiter, a spokesman for T.I. at its Dallas headquarters, said. "We've been in the process of conducting a self-audit in this area. Some (of the chips) are in compliance with specifications and drawings."

The microcircuits are subjected to specifications in drawings, and Neureiter said they undergo 100-200 tests.

The suspect chips are against a backdrop of other trial quality control problems involving the military that led to the latest case, to halt acceptance of 14 F-404 jet engines. The engines are built by the General Electric Co. of Lynn, Mass.

Texas crime rate for first half of '84 drops slightly, DWI arrests decline

United Press International AUSTIN — Declines in murders, robberies, aggravated assaults and burglaries dropped the Texas crime rate down 3.7 percent in the first half of 1984, the Department of Public Safety reported Monday.

Texas' crime rate for the period of January-June 1984 stood at 2,879.8 crimes per 100,000 people, compared to a rate of 2,989.7 per 100,000 Texans during the same period one year ago. The number of actual crimes dropped by 1 percent to 452,825.

"Murders were down 8.2 percent, robbery cases dropped almost 10 percent, aggravated assaults declined by almost 4 percent, and burglaries were down 5.1 percent," said DPS Director Col. Jim Adams.

Drug arrests, which are not calculated in the overall crime rate, were up 16.6 percent. Drunk driving arrests declined 7 percent with 66,959 DWI arrests in the first half of 1984 compared to 71,972 for the first six months of last year.

Adams said the decline in DWI arrests indicated more people are

obeying laws. "Hopefully, the increased public awareness about the driving problem and tougher laws have reduced the number of offenders on our roads," he said.

"But the number of arrests we still have a serious and DWI enforcement continues to be a major priority of police agencies," he said.

The crime rate is based on data made by 776 state, county and law enforcement agencies.
