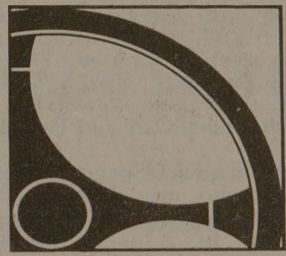

Dollar soars in Europe; sets records

LONDON — The dollar soared to unprecedented heights on European currency markets Tuesday, leaving dealers mystified as it set new records against the British, French, Italian, and Belgian currencies.

Currency traders across Europe were at a loss to offer any fresh explanations for the dollar's upward spiral. Karl Otto Poehl, president of the West German central bank, warned that European banks were virtually powerless to halt the rise of the U.S. currency.

"The market is really crazy because there are no new reasons for the dollar to climb, but everyone still wants them," said a trader on the Zurich foreign exchange, where the dollar closed at a 7 1/2-year high against the usually mighty Swiss currency.

"The dollar just keeps rising into the void. There are simply no sellers and anyone buying a moderate sum can push the price up quickly," a dealer in Paris said. "There is a general feeling, however, that we are arriving at the top."

In London, the pound crashed to an all-time low of \$1.232, whipping up a dollar backlash led by Dr. David Owen, leader of Britain's Social Democratic Party, who told an American Chamber of Commerce luncheon in London that the dollar was "grossly overvalued."

In the French capital, the dollar closed at another record of 9.5187 French francs, up from 9.4275, and in Brussels at an all-time high of 63.30 Belgian francs, up from 62.375.

In Milan, the U.S. currency vaulted over the 1,900-lira barrier to close at a record 1,909 lira, up from 1,885.

The dollar also was up in Frankfurt to an 11 1/2-year high of 3.1155 German marks, compared to Monday's close of 3.0737. The dollar, trading at its highest since 1977 in Switzerland, closed at 2.547 Swiss francs, up from 2.5277.

"The U.S. dollar is currently grossly overvalued, some would say by about a third, and some substantial correction of its value cannot be long delayed beyond the presidential election in November," Owen warned businessmen at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon.

High American interest rates — between 1 and 8 percentage points above European rates — provide the basis for the dollar's strength, but analysts said its current performance defies rational explanation.

Senator urges inquest due to shortage of corn

WASHINGTON — Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, Tuesday urged the Department of Agriculture to work closely with other investigators in Texas "to get to the bottom" of a shortage of 1 million bushels of corn at the nation's largest grain elevator.

Texas Agriculture Department officials shut down and padlocked the giant PLB Grain Storage complex near Plainview last Friday after confirming a shortage of government-owned corn worth \$3.1 million.

The owner of the west Texas elevator, P.L. Blake of Greenwood, Miss., has until Thursday to show

the federal government he can come up with the missing corn and until mid-October to show why his state license should not be permanently revoked.

"I am surprised by this discovery, particularly in light of statements by U.S. Department of Agriculture officials who inspected this facility last year when questions were raised about its operation," said Bentsen.

The PLB complex came under scrutiny last year when Texas officials charged a deterioration of the quality of 21.5 million bushels of government-owned grain stored there.

Texas officials earlier this year urged Agriculture Secretary John Block to release the corn to drought-stricken Texas farmers and ranchers. He refused until Congress last year authorized the Emergency Livestock Feed Program which offered about 83 million bushels of corn at discounted prices to the ranchers and farmers.

The Commodity Credit Corp., which stores and insures federal-owned grain, had loaded out most of its grain at PLB in the last six to nine months under the emergency feed program. CCC officials said there was supposed to be 1.8 million bushels left before the shortage was discovered.
