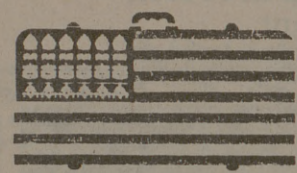

Dental records identify injured New York youth

EAGLE, Colo. — By using dental records, a comatose teenager, badly beaten while apparently hitchhiking to California, was identified Tuesday as a resident of New York state, the Eagle County Sheriff's Department said.

In hopes the youth was their missing son, a Texas couple flew to Colorado and remained at the boy's bedside in Grand Junction to offer support.

The youth, identified as Scott Yoos, 18, of Geneseo, N.Y., was last seen Thursday when he left the home of relatives in Jefferson County to hitchhike to California.

Yoos was found late last week wandering along a mountain road in Eagle County. Police theorize he had been hitchhiking when he was picked up and beaten.

"Yoos' identity was confirmed

by dental records in New York and in Colorado," an Eagle County Sheriff's Department dispatcher said.

"A physical identification also was made by relatives. His parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Fred Yoos, have been notified and are expected to be reunited with their son in Grand Junction this evening," the dispatcher said.

Earlier Tuesday, Steve Ward, a spokesman for St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Junction, said Mr. and Mrs. James Harvey of Andrews were at Yoos' bedside. The Harveys flew to Colorado last weekend hoping the then-unknown youth might be their son, Christopher, 15, who disappeared during a camping trip in southwestern Colorado last July.

"Even though he isn't their son, they have continued to stay by him," Ward said. "They are parents who still have to find

their son, and this is a boy who needs to find his parents.

"They've been talking to the boy and getting some response, like the grasp of a hand."

The Harvey youth has been missing since July 11, when he left his family's campsite in the San Juan Mountains to walk his dog. The dog returned, but relatives and friends found no trace of the boy during a three-week search.

Phone conversations Monday, between a St. Mary's doctor and the Harvey family doctor in Andrews, determined the boy in the hospital does not have fillings that Chris should have had, Ward said.

The discovery of Yoos rekindled bad feelings about Harvey's disappearance. His parents said he was kidnapped while officials considered Chris a runaway.

New hurricane develops

Hortense to miss Florida

MIAMI — Hurricane Hortense crept toward Bermuda Tuesday with 75 mph winds and forecasters predict the storm will strengthen before skirting the island's east coast in the next few days.

At midday, Hortense was located about 325 miles southeast of Bermuda, moving slowly northwest. Gale force winds extended out 150 miles to the north and 100 miles to the south of the storm's center.

The hurricane grew out of an extra-tropical disturbance that forecasters had been watching for several days. It began to drift to the

north-northwest at about 5 mph Monday and was classified a tropical storm after satellite pictures indicated the disturbance had developed an eye and circulating wind patterns.

The storm's wind speed grew from 39 mph to 75 mph in less than 24 hours as it stalled in the Atlantic Ocean.

Forecaster Bob Case at the National Hurricane Center says Hortense will probably grow fast for the next 24 hours and then turn north-northeast passing east of Bermuda.

"It doesn't look like it will move over land. It'll probably pass east of Bermuda. Right now it's only affecting shipping interests around Ber-

muda," Case said.

Hortense is the eighth tropical storm of the June-through-November hurricane season in the Atlantic-Caribbean region.

Hurricane Diana struck a 30-mile stretch of the North Carolina coast with 115 mph winds two weeks ago. Damage was estimated at more than \$67 million.

Another tropical storm currently threatens the Bahamas. Forecasters are watching a tropical depression in the southeastern Bahamas. At noon EDT Tuesday, the ill-defined center of the system was located about 275 miles east-southeast of Nassau.

'Ghostbusters' fan club created

PITTSBURGH — Jim Garvey and Mark Lister ain't afraid a' no ghosts. Nor are 25,000 people who they say are members of their fan club for "Ghostbusters," the summer's blockbuster movie.

Their shop in nearby Swissvale was Fantasy Traders until July, when it became Ghostbusters. That was after they secured the right — for an estimated \$10,000 — from Columbia Pictures Industries Inc. to form a national Ghostbusters fan club.

They market, for \$8.95, a kit that certifies each member a Ghostbuster.

"Job applications" are sent to those who express interest in becoming Ghostbusters, or ghost removers, like the characters portrayed by Bill Murray, Dan Aykroyd and Harold Ramis in the comedy that features spectacular special effects and Si-

gourney Weaver.

A kit is sent, and later four newsletters, says Garvey, 33, a former psychotherapist who, like Lister, chucked his job 18 months ago to market movie memorabilia full time.

"When I worked in the county jail, I was dealing with all the rapists and thieves in Pittsburgh," he says. "I decided it's a lot more fun to take people out of reality than to take them back into reality."

The kit contains a bumper sticker and a uniform patch with the Ghostbusters symbol (startled ghost beneath red circle and slash); a laminated ID card, saying the member is empowered to deal with paranormal manifestations, and a metal badge and certificate saying the property is protected by Ghostbusters.

Garvey says club members live from Toronto to San Diego, and are 4 or 5 to 60 or 70 years old, the majority being teens.

Twenty firefighters from Indiana, Iowa, sent in applications a day after a TV show featured the club, he says.

In their business, timing is everything, says Garvey, pointing to "E.T., The Extraterrestrial."

"A lot of people really got burned on E.T. merchandise," he says. "Dec. 25, 1982, was the turning point. Anything with E.T. on it sold before that Christmas," said Garvey. After Christmas you couldn't give the stuff away.

Columbia gets a percentage of each kit, Garvey says, noting he makes expenses but hopes to make a profit on further Ghostbusters memorabilia.

While they also look for new film products, the gangbusters Ghostbusters business keeps them and four employees far busier than they expected.

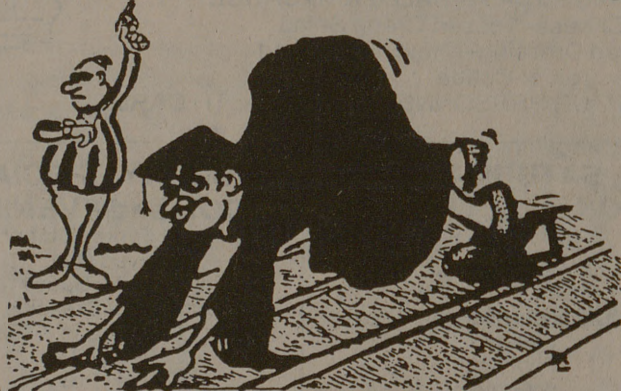
