

WASHINGTON — House and Senate negotiators Wednesday reached agreement on a compromise version of a bill by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, to clamp down on pilots and owners of airplanes in-

The measure to allow the Federal Aviation Administration to revoke the licenses of pilots involved in illegal drug trafficking now goes back to both the House and Senate for an expected quick final approval before being sent to President Reagan for
