A.P. Beutel Health Center. Loo said he treated Goodrich for pharyngitis — a throat infection — on Aug. 29. He said prescribed erythromysin, an antibiotic, for Goodrich's condition. However, the medication did not contribute to

Goodrich's collapse, Loo said. Turner said the grand jury may decide to bring charges ranging from involuntary manslaughter to negligent homicide against the students involved in Goodrich's death.

To bring charges of involuntary manslaughter, the grand jury must have proof that the parties involved knew the consequences of their ac-tions and ignored them, Turner

Involuntary manslaughter is a third degree felony, carrying a penalty of two to 10 years imprisonment in the state penitentiary and a fine of up to \$5,000. Negligent homicide is

a class A misdemeanor.
