Brazos Valley Museum's fund-raiser shows history, science, art of the area

It was quite a production for such a small museum, but the Brazos Valley Museum pulled off its fund-raising Discovery Night with a lot of class. Discovery Night is an annual fund-raising event held for the museum and hosted by the board of trustees. Val Selvy, the director of the museum, gets the credit for a successful party.

"Discovery Night started out as a small reception last year and it keeps getting bigger," Selvy said.

She said the fund-raiser began as a project to make money for the museum by selling tickets for seats in the president's field box for football games. The reception for the ticket sale has turned into the all-out gala called Discovery Night. The purpose of the event was to show some of the history, art, science, and music of the local area.

And a discovery it is for many people around town, especially A&M students. Selvy said that about half of the museum's members are from A&M, but that most of those members are faculty and staff.

"We get a lot of students from the university to do volunteer work for

us," Selvy said. "And that's just as good as donating money."

The museum, nestled in a cozy section of the Brazos Center, works

on a budget of \$70,000, much of which is funded by the Astin and Winkler Trusts and the United Way. The museum provides many edu-

cational programs, trips and displays for kids and adults. Selvy said plans to house the museum in a building of its own are underway.

Rodolfo Loo, staff physician at the A.P. Beutel Health Center.

Loo said he treated Goodrich for pharyngitis — a throat infection — on Aug. 29. He said prescribed erythromycin, an antibiotic, for Goodrich's condition. However, the medication did not contribute to Goodrich's collapse, Loo said.

Turner said the grand jury may decide to bring charges ranging from involuntary manslaughter to

negligent homicide against the students involved in Goodrich's death.

To bring charges of involuntary manslaughter, the grand jury must have proof that the parties involved knew the consequences of their actions and ignored them, Turner said.

Involuntary manslaughter is a third degree felony, carrying a penalty of two to 10 years imprisonment in the state penitentiary and a fine of up to \$5,000. Negligent homicide is a class A misdemeanor.

influential committee that influences the expenditure of thousands of dollars." On the basis of the board's decisions, Dollar said, the Food Services Department makes its budget and determines board rates.

Dollar said A&M is not one of the nation's 10 largest schools in terms of enrollment, but the number of students who buy A&M's optional board plan is among the nation's 10 highest.

"That means the student menu board members have done a lot of things right," Dollar said.

Sbisa Dining Hall is the largest dining facility in the United States, Dollar said. It serves 4,500 students — almost 50 percent of the students on board plan.

Sbisa also has a larger fast-food section than any other dining facility in the nation, Dollar said.

Dollar added that Sbisa Dining Hall has a colorful history. It served as the student center for years until the Memorial Student Center was built in 1952, he said.

Dollar said when he was a student in the 1940s, Sbisa hosted dances throughout the spring with famous musicians such as Count Basie and Russ Morgan.

Sbisa Dining Hall has hosted such notable guests as presidents Franklin Delano Roosevelt and Dwight D. Eisenhower and attorney Clarence Darrow.

Dollar's interest in food service has a long history. As a student at A&M, Dollar prepared desserts and bread in Sbisa Dining Hall and

waited tables in Duncan Dining Hall. During World War II, he led U.S. Army troops at Normandy Beach. In 1965 Dollar returned to A&M to direct the Food Services Department.

Dollar is a longtime officer in the Texas Restaurant Association, serving this year as secretary. He's also past president of the Society for Advancement of Food Service Research, and an active member of the National Restaurant Association of College and University Food Services.

Former officer charged with robbery count

LUBBOCK — An arrest warrant was issued Thursday for former Texas Tech University policeman Donnie Newton who is charged with robbing an armored car employer of \$84,000 on campus Wednesday, officials said.
