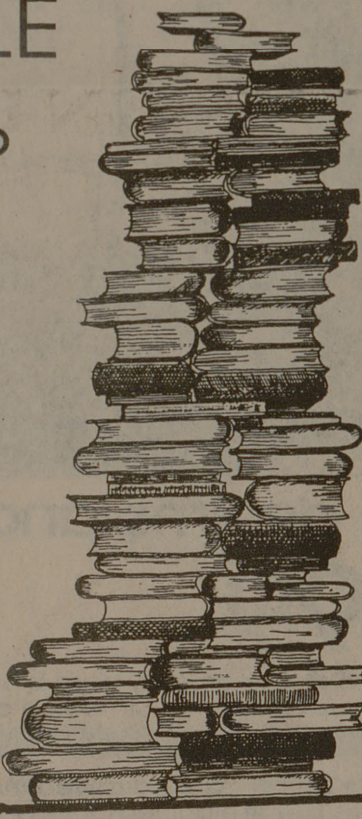

Limerick-writing computer coming to area gift shop

Trying to find the perfect card for a special person can be difficult. The Computer Poet at the Rainbow Store in Post Oak Mall combines the specialty of gift personalization with computer technology to create unique greeting cards for any occasion.

The store should be getting its Computer Poet this week.

The Computer Poet can compose a personalized three-verse, 15-line limerick in seconds with a little help from the customer. The customer must supply answers to questions about the person who will receive the verse.

First, the customer asks for the name of the person receiving the card. If the name is not stored, it will ask if the name is male or female and how many syllables it has. Next the customer enters where the person lives.

Now the customer tells the computer what message he wants to send. The list of possibilities range from the common "Happy Birthday" and "I Love You" to "You Owe Me Money."

The computer will then ask for the person's occupation. Sixty possibilities are stored in the computer, and the choice is entered by a three-letter code.

Next a dominant and a secondary trait are entered, followed by the name of the card's sender.

Lincoln family hopes for Texas oil fortune

LINCOLN, Neb. — A Lincoln family could inherit part of a long-lost Texas oil fortune worth as much as \$1.5 trillion if the courts rule they are indeed the rightful heirs, the Lincoln Sunday Journal-Star reported.

In a copyright story, retired Burlington Northern machinist Robert Cruey said family stories have been circulating for years in eastern Kentucky, his birthplace. The 19-year-old Lincoln resident said one of the last things his mother told him was that someday the family would be fabulously wealthy.

The stories, often sketchy and contradictory, center on several brothers of the Meadors or Medders family who left McCreary County in southeast Kentucky in the 1800s to seek their fortune in Texas.

According to family tradition, the brothers obtained one-eighth mineral rights in lands near the Spindletop oil field near Beaumont. Oil was struck in 1901 and Spindletop yielded a bonanza of black gold that made it one of the richest of the Texas oil fields.

On visits back home to Kentucky, the brothers came loaded with bulging money belts and boxes of shoes for their families, or so the story goes.

In the 1880s, other members of the Meadors family moved west to homestead in northern and eastern Texas. The younger Meadors constructed wooden oil derricks for the oil companies, which frequently gave them a fraction of their mineral rights in lieu of cash.

The family in Kentucky eventually lost track of their Texas kin, and over the decades the details of the Meadors' mineral and land holdings were lost to memory.

The oil companies did not forget,

If the customer does not like the first version of the poem, he can have the computer try again with the same data.

After selecting a version of the verse, the customer chooses one of 80 picture cards to display it.

For \$3.99 the customer has a personalized, one-of-a-kind greeting card ready to send without having to search through a lot of card stores.

Rainbow Store manager Bill Watterman said the store is one of the first in the state to get a Computer Poet.

"They are just now getting to Texas," he said. "As of right now there only a couple in the state."

About 50 to 60 Computer Poets are in use nationwide.

Watterman said he came to the computer at a show in Dallas Market Hall and signed up to purchase one. Using existing software on the Apple Macintosh computer, the Computer Poet can compose more than 10 million limericks.

The machine was invented by Dwight Minkler II and introduced in January by the Computer Poet Corp. of Incline Village, Nev.

Mansel Ocheltree created the corporation to market the Computer Poet internationally.

though. According to family members, oil companies such as American, Mobil, Texaco and Phillips agreed to send percentages of the profits into escrow accounts in Meadors' names at various banks around the country.

In the 1960s, a family member happened to see a legal advertisement in a newspaper. The legal government was looking for heirs to the Meadors estate, which that time was valued at \$20 billion.

The legal claims have come and furious since then, but no one has proved to whom the fortune belongs. Two or possibly three people are vying for the riches, which are estimated to range anywhere from \$20 billion to \$1.5 trillion, "about as big as the national deficit," Cruey, 57.

As many as 4,000 people, including Cruey and his five children, are involved in one faction led by Dan Meadors, civil servant Jewell Meadors.

Jim Mitchell of Lexington, Va., spokesman for the group, said family members are collecting genealogical data to prove their relationship to the Meadors. Mitchell said he hopes to take their claim to court soon.

The Crueys are connected to the original Meadors through Cruey's great-grandmother, Margaret Meadors.

For a time, the Crueys were associated with a rival claim led by Howard Meadows of Oneida, Tenn. That group is said to have allied itself with a third faction run by James Clark of Cincinnati and Dan Proffit of Elmsmere, Ky.

About two weeks ago, the case was transferred to a Texas court. A similar suit was thrown out of court years ago.
