

PUC denies company's rate increase



AUSTIN — Opponents of a \$3 million rate increase being sough Texas Utilities Electric Co., told Public Utility Commission Tues the rate hike should be denied b cause the company's earnings area ready embarrassingly high. "The proof of the pudding is

the tasting, and the bottom linest financial performance of the or pany," said Earnest Casstevens, lawyer for a group of electric or eratives. "The financial performance of the company is embarra-

ingly high." The full PUC was poised to issue final order after a commission exa iner's recommendation that company receive only a \$7 millio increase.

Casstevens was joined Tuesday Assistant Public Counsel Geoffre Gay in criticizing the Dallas-base utility's request for any rate increas

'It is imperative that the comm sion recognize that it is entirely ina propriate for the company to be warded for its greed," said G whose agency represents resident and small business rate-payers.

Solar prospector prepares for future galactic gold rush

LUDLOW, Mass. - While the crew of the space shuttle Challenger was completing its work Tuesday, a Ludlow man was planning for fu-ture shuttle trips which he hopes will lead to a space-age gold rush.

Thomas Budnick, 38, thinks the solar system is rich in gold, silver, diamonds and other precious metals, he said. He has staked claims on

more than 50 asteroids and planets. "There's gold there," Budnick said. "They've already proved that. The asteroids are especially loaded with gold, and lots of platinum and strategic metals.

Budnick, relying on mining laws dating from 1872, has registered deeds to the claims with the only clerk he could find to take them, in he Sabine County Courthouse in Hemphill, he said.

Officials in three Massachusetts counties refused to register his claims. But the clerk in Texas agreed, as long as Budnick paid the filing fees of \$3 for the first page and \$2 for each additional page.
