Huskies become 5th to don No. 1 ranking

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NEW YORK — Given the rack record of No. 1 teams this ear and Washington's past expe-ience as No. 1, it's no wonder Huskies coach Don James is leery his team's ascent to the top.

Washington became the fifth eam to be ranked No. 1 this year by the UPI Board of Coaches, moving up from third after fexas and Oklahoma played to a 5-15 tie Saturday.

"It doesn't do any good at this ime of the year," James said of being No. 1. "It's only good after

This is the second time Washington has been No. 1. The Huskies were top-ranked for four weeks in 1982 until being upset 43-31 by Stanford in the eighth week of the season.

This week it was a 37-15 vicory over Stanford that moved he Huskies to the top

"The 1982 club did it on what hey did in the 1981 Rose Bowl," mes said. "This team has done on their own.

But James is hardly excited ver being No. 1.
"It really doesn't matter to us,"

nesaid. "We really don't care."
The Huskies received 24 of 41 st-place votes and 570 total oints after improving to 6-0.

Oklahoma held second with 3

first-place votes and 537 1/2 points while Texas slipped from irst to third with 9 ½ first-place total and 530 ½ points. One toach split his first-place vote beween Texas and Oklahoma.

No. 4 Boston College (two first-place votes and 488 points), No. 5 Brigham Young (one first-place vote and 435 points), No. 6 Nebraska (389 points) and No. 7 outhern Methodist (344 points) held their ranking from last reek. Ohio State picked up the nal first-place vote and 291 oints for eighth.

Total points are based on 15 for first place, 14 for second, etc. No. 9 Louisiana State and No.

10 Miami round out the top 10, followed by No. 11 South Carolina, No. 12 Oklahoma State, No. 13 Auburn, No. 14 Georgia, No. 15 Kentucky, No. 16 Florida State, No. 17 Iowa, No. 18 Florida, No. 19 West Virginia and No. 20 Michigan. Auburn, Miami, Nebraska and

Texas were previously ranked No. 1 this year

Kentucky made the biggest jump this week, moving up five spots after improving to 5-0 with a 17-13 victory over Mississippi State. South Carolina and Anburn jumped three spots after the Gamecocks knocked off Pitts-burgh 45-21 and Auburn pulled out a 42-41 thriller over Florida State. Florida State tumbled eight places after the loss.

West Virginia and Michigan made their way back into the Top 20. West Virginia's 20-10 victory over Syracuse brought the Mountaineers back after a two-week absence. Michigan blasted Northwestern 31-0 after dropping out of the ratings last week for the first time all year.

Penn State and Purdue fell from the ratings. The Nittany Li-ons, ranked No. 12 last week, were upset 6-0 by Alabama and are unranked for the first time this season. Purdue dropped from No. 17 after being hammered 40-3 by Iowa.

In games matching ranked teams this week, Boston College visits West Virginia, Louisiana State hosts Kentucky and Iowa hosts Michigan.

For the second straight week, the Southeastern Conference has five ranked teams — LSU, Auburn, Georgia, Kentucky and
