

# Dry winter air harmful to skin

NEW YORK — It isn't the cold so much as the dry air that threatens the skin and hair in winter months. The hazards of low humidity lie indoors and out, the experts say. Sometimes the indoors is worse than

the outside. "I read once that in many cases the humidity indoors gets below that of a desert," said Dr. Gary Dugan, director of research and devel-

From talks with researchers at cosmetics and hair care product houses, here is a program for "winterizing."

• If at any office where control is out of your hands, try keeping a vase of fresh flowers in water at the desk. Keep the air moist.

Outdoors, you can't control the humidity or temperature, but you can protect with moisturizers and hair conditioners against ravages of wind and sun.

• Use conditioners to prevent what Avon's Dugan calls "flyaway," the electrical charge in winter that makes hair more difficult to comb and brush.

• Add protection with such things as leg warmers, gloves or mittens, even ski masks to protect facial skin.

• Wear something on the head. "We don't go around without shirt or sweater in winter," said Corbett, 'But we tend to leave the head uncovered. It is a fact, not a fallacy, that much of the body heat escapes through the scalp."

• Use the night hours for beauty treatment. In many cases, you're ex posed to the same room dryness as during the day. Use moisturizers to replace some of the loss. • You might cut down on the

NEW YORK - From garlic buds to chicken noodle soup and Linus Pauling's fabled vitamin C, remedies and preventives of all kinds do battle with the common cold — especially during fall and winter.

Prevention and cure, the goals, remain elusive. The evidence: despite the ferocity of efforts of people try-ing to avoid colds, millions get them anyway.

Symptoms of the common cold go away in six or seven days at the most - two or three at the least, says Dr. R. Gordon Davis, who talked about both the common cold and flu dur-
