Ceremony honors Vietnam mothers

TYLER — Somehow it seemed appropriate. A gray, cold day would represent memories of relatives from a gray, cold war.

Gold star mothers whose sons and daughters were killed in the Vietnam War were honored Sunday, as were the exploits of American servicemen who died in the southeast Asian war.

American flags, flowers and hand-written personal remembrances of loved ones adorned the black plexiglass wall of the 250-foot Vietnam memorial replica in Tyler's Bergfeld Park. Teenagers not old enough to remember the pains of the war posed with family members.

Years of disgrace for the Vietnam veterans and the families whose sons and daughters died in the war were pushed aside Sunday, hopefully for the last time, said area gold star mothers who attended the ceremonies.

Catherine Johnson, of Grand Saline, whose son, Staff Sgt. Alvin Lee Shadwick, was killed in Vietnam in February 1969 said a decade has made a difference in the public's perception of Americans who served in that war.

"They were treated like a bunch of people on marijuana and were told they had no business being there," Johnson explained.

"Today, though, is wonderful. They (society) are beginning to recognize them and it's long overdue." Helen Howell, of Tyler, whose son, Staff Sgt. Randall Howell, was killed in August 1966 after 7 years service in Vietnam, said although she wanted her son home, she knew what he wanted to do was right.

Selection for bench criticized

HOUSTON — The Harris County Republican chairman Wednesday criticized Gov. Mark White for appointing to a judgeship a man who pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated and been sued by the State of Texas for non-payment of a student loan.

The GOP's Russ Mather alleged that Houston attorney W. Burnett faces a federal tax lien more than \$45,000.

Burnett was not immediately available to comment on Mather's statement.

"Mark White must have made an appointment of Jay W. Burnett, the 351st District Court in Harris County blindfolded and without regard to the man's past record," Mather said.

Mather added that the man appointed should be someone who had good examples.

Mather made the statement in support of Republican Al Phipps, who is running against Burnett in next month's general election.

Burnett pleaded guilty to DWI in Harris County in January 1980, served a one-year probation, Mather said.

2 prison wardens leaving

ROSHARON — The warden of an assistant warden of Darrington Unit of the state prison system where four inmates have been stabbed to death this year, resigned effective Nov. 1.

"There must be better ways to earn a living," Warden William Stricklin said.

"I've been thinking I had to make a choice between my private life being a warden," he said. "What should be paid more for all that they have to put up with."

The 40-year-old warden joined the Texas Department of Corrections as a guard in 1972. He will seek private employment. Assistant Warden D.R. Stricklin will become the agriculture manager at the Retrieve Unit near Angleton.

TDC spokesman Phil Guthrie said the transfer was made after Stricklin, 35, asked for an assignment with less pressure. Stricklin's salary was cut from \$34,020 to \$21,480.

Guthrie said a new warden assistant warden will be named in a few days.

About 1,900 Darrington inmates have been confined to cells except for one daily trip to a dining room. The confinement began Oct. 14 when an inmate was found stabbed to death in a shower.

"Our main concern is the safety of the inmates right now," Assistant Warden Norman E. McClure said.

A search of the unit following the slaying uncovered more than 100 handmade weapons, he said.

Auto insurance rates down

Board says no to hike

AUSTIN — The State Board of Insurance unanimously approved a 3.8 percent reduction in Texas automobile premiums Wednesday, rejecting the insurance industry's request for a 5.5 percent increase.

After a daylong hearing, the three-member board approved the new rates effective Feb. 1, 1985. The 3.8 percent reduction was suggested by the board.

Depending on the area of the state, its number of accidents and the cost of repairs, yearly savings to Texas policy holders will range from \$4 to \$94 for drivers of low- to mid-priced automobiles that carry standard coverage.

"With this decision, the companies writing private passenger auto insurance will still get a 16.9 percent average return on their net worth," board spokesman Jon Ford said.

"They've had fewer accidents and fewer fatalities and they're also making a lot of money on their investments, so a reduction in the premiums doesn't necessarily mean they're not going to continue making money," Ford added.

Industry officials asked for a 5.5 percent hike to follow last year's increase of 3.9 percent.

"I think it is a setback," Rick Gentry of the Insurance Information Institute said of the board's ruling. "I'm a little hesitant to characterize it as a major setback. We feel we made the most compelling case today."

Examples of new premium costs under the new rates are based on \$30,000 bodily injury coverage, \$15,000 property damage coverage, \$5,000 personal injury protection, \$50 deductible comprehensive coverage and \$200 deductible collision coverage.

In Houston, the maximum available yearly premium will drop \$754 to \$702 and in Dallas the rate will decrease from \$608 to \$575.

The only increases will be in El Paso County, where rates will rise \$28, and in Waller County, where a \$2 increase will take effect.

Other reductions include: Antonio, \$4; Fort Worth, \$3; Paso, \$8; Bowie County, \$11; Arillo, \$13; Starr, Hidalgo and Erion counties, \$11; Austin, Midland and Odessa, \$11; Plano, \$10.

Tower says Democrats are lying

HOUSTON — Lame-duck Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, said Wednesday that Democrats owe the elderly an apology for their recent claims that President Ronald Reagan is a threat to Social Security, claims that Tower called lies.

"They are preying on the fears of older Americans in an attempt to get their votes and their money," Tower told a news conference at the Harris County Reagan-Bush headquarters. "Frankly, the Democrats are lying to voters in Texas and throughout the country about Social Security."

"They are frightening senior citizens with totally unfounded claims that the benefits seniors depend on could be taken from them. Even more crass than those statements, however, is their effort to raise money by creating, and then taking advantage of, those false fears."

Since Reagan took office, Tower said, benefits for the average retired couple have increased by \$180 a month, or by more than \$2,000 a year.

He said benefits for the average retired worker have gone up 27 percent and benefits for the widow or widower of retired workers have increased 30 percent.

"I resent the Democrats' deceptions and I believe they owe senior citizens an apology," Tower said. "If there is anything senior citizens should be frightened about, it's the prospect that Walter Mondale will become president and once again put Social Security on the bankruptcy."

Later, at another news conference in Houston, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, Texas, held fast to the Democratic theme that Reagan announced a drastic cut of Social Security benefits after taking office.

Bentsen said that the Reagan administration has tried to cut Social Security benefits by almost 10 percent but that the benefits were defended and the cut defeated in Congress.
