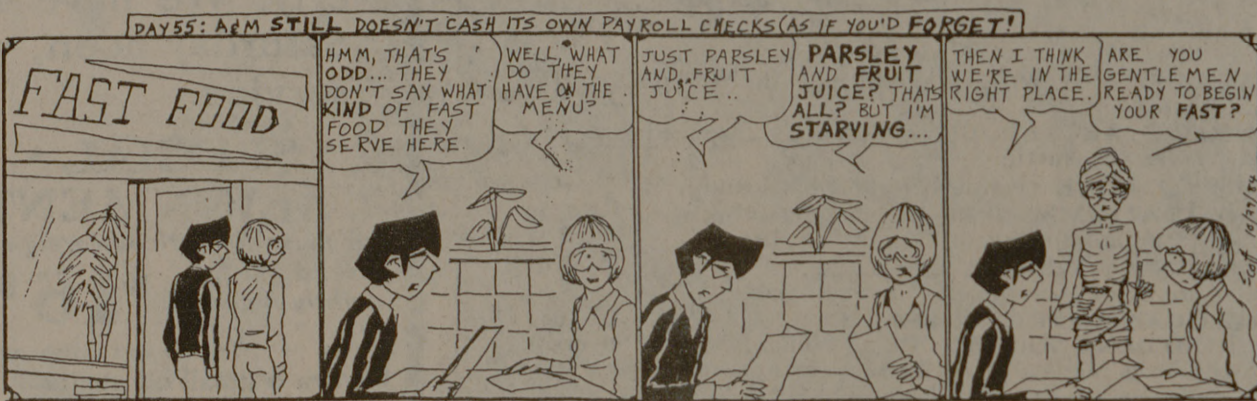

Jaycees sponsor haunted house in Bryan

The LaSalle Hotel in downtown Bryan is being transformed into the Hotel Terror as the Bryan-College Station Jaycees prepare for Halloween.

"We're trying to attract a little more attention to downtown Bryan," Jaycee Mark Bayliss said.

The Hotel Terror on Main Street will be open from 7 p.m. to midnight today, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Admission is \$2.50 for adults and \$1.75 for children. A coupon can be found in today's edition of The Battalion.

"Tonight is designated as College Night," said Bayliss, a Class of '80 marketing graduate. "College Night attempts to bring the student body to Bryan."

Students should bring their I.D. cards, he said.

Hotel Terror consists of eight rooms with different themes such as the Roach and Rat Room and the Operation Room, said Rex Par-

tridge, co-chairman for the LaSalle project.

Each tour through the first floor of the LaSalle Hotel will take about 20 minutes, he said.

Partridge, a project coordinator at Holster and Associates in College Station, said about 45 to 50 people will be working at the hotel each night.

The Jaycees sponsor annual haunted houses nationwide, Bayliss said. The Bryan-College Station Jaycees have been running a haunted house on Halloween for the past 20 years, he said.

Most of the Jaycees' projects are undertaken to improve the commu-

nity, Bayliss said.

Fund raisers in 1984 have included two Muscular Dystrophy Association carnivals over the Labor Day weekend and an ice cream making contest — The Great American Freeze Off — in July to benefit the cystic fibrosis foundation, Bayliss said.

Money raised from the haunted house will pay for expenses and fund future projects, said Partridge, an environmental design graduate from the Class of '83.

Bayliss said the Jaycees raised about \$4,500 from the haunted house last year. This year the Jaycees hope to raise between \$5,000 and \$7,500, he said.

"The Jaycees is a tremendous experience for young men to meet leading members of the community," Bayliss said. He has been a Jaycee for 3½ years.

The Bryan-College Station chapter of the Jaycees has about 8,320 members, making it the third largest chapter in Texas.

Academic program expanded

President Reagan began a program last year to recognize the academic achievements of high school seniors. This year the President's Academic Fitness (PAFA) program will be expanded to recognize the academic achievements of students in elementary schools and middle and junior high schools.

The program is modeled after physical fitness program begun by President Johnson in 1966, which concentrates on grades.

President Reagan said in a release that the program was initiated last year to encourage and motivate young people to pursue a core of academic courses and strive to reach their full academic potential.

To qualify for the PAFA, students must meet the minimum criteria established by the U.S. Department of Education. They must:

- Maintain a B+ grade average accumulated through elementary, junior high or senior high school (B+ is defined by 3.3 on a 4.0 scale or 85 on a scale of 100).

- Place in the 80th percentile on any nationally recognized standardized achievement test battery.

The College Station Independent School District participated in the PAFA program for high school seniors last year.

Sandy Parker, Consolidated High School principal, said a certificate signed by the president and a pin were given to 20 students in last year's graduating class of 200.

Dr. Mike Owens, superintendent of College Station Independent School District, said: "We make effort at the end of the year to provide some award for all the children in the district, so we'll probably do this program. It just hasn't been proved yet."

"It'll inspire some kids, but one it only inspires one then it's over it."

The Bryan Independent School District does not participate in a presidential program.

But this year Bryan High School will participate in Acadec, an academic competition for scholarships where students must have knowledge in everything from arts to social studies.

"This year instead of emphasis on sports, we are emphasizing academics," said Peggy White, a senior counselor at Bryan High, said.
