# Baby Fae upgraded to serious

LOMA LINDA, Calif. — Baby Fae, the 16-day-old infant with the baboon heart transplant, was taken off a respirator Monday and upgraded from critical to serious condition, a hospital spokeswoman said. "All vital signs are stable," Jayne McGill said. "She's been taken off the ventilator and is breathing easily on her own."

"Her heart is working well. The IV (intravenous) tubes have been removed and she is passing urine well. They expect her to start oral feeding later today."

Hospital spokeswoman Carolyn Hamilton said earlier the baby's mother had been playing gently with her daughter and "loving her."

"She's doing really well today," she said. "She's a healthier baby and more alert than before surgery."

Baby Fae is the first infant, and

the first person, known to receive a primate heart. The four adults all died shortly after surgery.

Doctors said the infant faced certain death without the transplant because she was born with an underdeveloped left side of the heart.

But some researchers were critical of Dr. Leonard Bailey, who performed the operation, saying a human heart is available in Southern California and should have been used instead.

Dr. Paul Terasaki, a UCLA Medical School professor who heads the California Regional Organ Procurement Agency, said the heart of a 2-month-old girl who had died was available for transplant the same day Baby Fae received her heart of a 7-month-old baboon.

"Our coordinator called the Loma Linda kidney transplant people," Terasaki told the Los Angeles

Times, but because they are a different team they were unaware that there was a need for a heart.

"I think that they did not make any effort to get a human infant heart because they were set on doing a baboon."

Dr. Jack Provonsha, director of Loma Linda's Center for Christian Bioethics, admitted that Bailey did not call the agency, but insisted the seriousness of Baby Fae's condition warranted the fastest possible action.

"Dr. Bailey might be faulted in a Monday-morning quarterbacking sense for not having called over there to see if they had a heart the right size," Provonsha said.

"But when you put that in the perspective of a patient who's in dire circumstances, and you face picking a new donor with no tissue typing, at the time it doesn't look like a very

## 50 followers in hospital as gypsy dies

MIAMI — Gypsy leader Frank Mitchell died Monday while his followers jammed a hospital corridor to honor their leader, despite objections to their numbers and their reported use of wine and candles in bedside ceremonies.

A spokeswoman at Baptist Hospital said Mitchell, 61, died from a variety of ailments about 5 p.m. Monday.

Seventy cousins and other relatives were lined up waiting to get into Mitchell's room Monday. As many as 50 have converged on the hospital since Mitchell, leader of the clan, was admitted Oct. 16, officials said.

"His people came from all over the United States. This has been a tradition for a thousand years. When one of us is sick, the whole family is one," Robert Mitchell said in his thick Romanian accent.

Hospital spokeswoman Jo Baxter said rules limit the number of visitors to four in the critical care area where Mitchell was being treated for blood poisoning, kidney failure, stroke, a perforated intestine and difficulty breathing.

"We have to try to accommodate other patients and families," Baxter said. "I have seen upwards of 50 family members in the hospital one time. We feel like we have to go over backward to try and accommodate Mr. Mitchell's family."

Among the concessions was a decision to allow the family to bring wine to Mitchell's bedside for communion.

Hospital employees said they tried to bring lighted candles to Mitchell's bedside. Oxygen tanks located only a few feet away, family members denied the charge, however.

"They have allowed us to pass cross by his bed," said cousin A.D. Mitchell. "We have not lit candles. We have enough sense to know that they have gas in them."

Some family members reportedly at hospital-owned facilities relatives of ailing patients. "We had lodging tented by week and they threw us out there," said Irene Mitchell, the man's daughter. "I admit we were a bit of a nuisance, there were some of us."

"That would have been a 16-month-old heart being put in a mature chest. The heart was probably too big. This decision was screened for size."

Dr. Richard Stiehm, director of UCLA's division of pediatric cardiology and allergy and a transplant consultant on transplant surgery disagreed.

"A 2-month-old heart is not necessarily," he said. "The size offers a lot, and it could have been possible."

Stiehm also was not as optimistic as Bailey that the baby's immune system will accept the heart. "It's going to reject sooner or later, that's for sure," he said. "A human heart transplant would do that, too."

# 12 OPEC members to cut production

GENEVA — Twelve of OPEC's 13 oil ministers meeting in an emergency session Monday agreed to curb their oil output to maintain the cartel's \$29-a-barrel base price, but maverick Nigeria balked at agreeing to production cuts.

"We are moving," Saudi Arabian Oil Minister Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani said after the first formal round of crisis talks at the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' summit.

"All countries have agreed to reduce production except Nigeria." OPEC's crisis erupted when non-members Norway and Britain

dropped the price of their light North Sea crude to retain customers. Nigeria, one of the poorest OPEC members, responded by unilaterally slashing its similar quality oil by a barrel.

Representatives of all 13 OPEC members — Algeria, Ecuador, Gabon, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Kuwait, Libya, Nigeria, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates and Venezuela — are in Switzerland for the summit.

Yamani said the ministers were trying to work out a plan to lower OPEC's current production ceiling by 1.5 million barrels to 16 million barrels a day to bolster prices in the

face of weak demand and outside competition.

A senior Persian Gulf delegate said OPEC planned to curtail output for the next five to six weeks until oil demand picks up in the peak winter season.

The delegate said the atmosphere at the summit was "very tense" with ministers divided over how the production cutback should be shared among the 13 OPEC nations.

The ministers also were split on the issue of price differentials, or how much members can charge for various grades of crude oil, he said.

Indonesian Oil Minister Subroto

told reporters the meeting focused on three problems: determining OPEC's \$29 base price, disciplining and strengthening discipline in OPEC and agreeing on price differentials.

All the ministers agreed that the summit opened at the guarded Intercontinental Hotel focus on cutting production rather than its \$29 base price.

But industry experts predicted long and difficult bargaining would be needed to get OPEC nations with large populations and debts to agree to production

# UAW, Mack Truck reach tentative agreement

ALLEN TOWN — Negotiators for Mack Trucks Inc. and 9,200 United Auto Workers reached a tentative contract agreement Monday, ending a 9-day strike that closed the No. 2 heavy truck manufacturer's plants in three states.

The three-year tentative pact was reached following extensive negotiations conducted under a news blackout imposed by agreement with both

sides, UAW Vice President Bill Casstevens and Mack Vice President William Walker Sr. said in a joint announcement.

The strike, which began Oct. 21 when the union's two-year contract expired, was the first by the UAW against Mack since 1964.

As a condition of the tentative settlement, the union agreed to halt its strike pending a ratification vote by union members, the statement said.

No date or the vote was set, but a union spokeswoman said it could be held "sooner."

Terms of the contract were not announced.

"We have achieved our goals of winning improved job security and greater economic fairness for our members at Mack," Casstevens said.

Workers were expected to return to their jobs on the first morning shift today, a company spokesman

said.

The walkout closed Mack's Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Maryland plants and resulted in 440 workers at an assembly plant in Oakville, Ontario.
