On the trip, however, she is hit by a car, develops amnesia and takes on Rebecca's persona. Not even Tom Conti, who plays the writer of the real Rebecca Ryan novels, can convince her that she is not Rebecca. French star Giancarlo Giannini also has a part in this delightful comedy that is full of slapstick and adventure. PG.

Beverly Hills Cop: Eddie Murphy, in a role written for (can you believe this?) Sylvester Stallone, stars as a Detroit cop who follows the trail of a friend's killer to Beverly Hills. This is supposed to be a comedy-thriller with tons of action and Murphy is supposed to be as great as always. Paramount executives are already discussing a sequel. R.

Night Patrol: Linda Blair stars in this film that sounds, not surprisingly, like the highly popular "Police Academy." The comedy should be low and the laughs loud as we learn what happens to policemen while they patrol the lawless city after dark. R.
