Johnson predicted 49er win

SAN FRANCISCO — In the days before Super Bowl XIX, finding predictions was easy. Everybody seemed to know exactly what was going to happen.

Some people even turned out to be right.

There was Joe Montana, for example, examining the astounding passing statistics Dan Marino had assembled this season.

Marino's numbers were produced in a Miami offense that used its ground game for decoration. The Dolphins traveled through the air — much like the San Francisco team that won the Super Bowl three years ago.

"I don't think we threw 70 percent of the time," Montana said, remembering that team. "That's impressive, when you throw that much and you're winning."

Then he added an interesting kicker. "A lot of teams throw that much, but they're losing," he said.

On Sunday, Marino set Super Bowl passing records with 50 passes and 29 completions. And he lost.

San Francisco guard Randy Cross thought he recognized the Dolphins before this Super Bowl. They reminded him of his own team in 1981.

"Miami's going into this Super Bowl a lot like we did three years ago, with more of an implied running threat than a real running threat," he said.

The implied running threat gained just 25 yards on Sunday.

Miami defensive coordinator Chuck Studley was worried about Montana's mobility. "He's most dangerous when he gets out of the pocket," Studley said. "We've got to contain him, keep him from getting outside."

The Dolphins did not accomplish that and Montana set a Super Bowl quarterback rushing record with 59 yards.

Tackle Keith Fahnhorst had been asked about the 49er ground game in what seemed certain to be a bombs-away air show between Marino and Montana.

"I hope it's being overlooked by the Dolphins," he said. "I'm sure not though. I think it'll be one of the keys of the game as far as controlling the ball and keeping their offense off the field."

The 49ers were not in awe of Marino's record-breaking accomplishments. Gary "Big Hands" Johnson said he thought the Niners would be able to handle him.

"Our defense can play great against Miami," he predicted. "We don't have to get to the quarterback, but we can get close, keep our hands up and block his line of vision. This defense can do anything it wants, and that's the truth."

By Sunday night, no one would dare call him a liar.

SWC Tournament tickets on sale

Tickets to the 1985 Southwest Conference Post-Season Basketball Tournament are now on sale at the Texas A&M ticket office at G. Rollie White Coliseum. The tourney is scheduled for March 8, 9 and 10 at Reunion Arena in Dallas.

Under the new format for the tournament, the first-round games that formerly were played at three university sites have been eliminated. This year, the top eight finishing teams in the final conference standings will go to the Dallas tournament site.

There will be four first-round games on Friday, March 8 — teams 4 and 5 will meet at 12:08 p.m.; teams 1 and 8 will meet at 2:08 p.m.; teams 2 and 7 will meet at 7:08 p.m.; and teams 3 and 6 will meet at 9:08 p.m. There will be two semi-final games on Saturday, March 9, starting at 1:08 p.m. and 3:08 p.m. The championship game will be Sunday, March 10 at 2:08 p.m.

Tickets for all seven games of the tournament are \$50 each and are sold only in books of seven. No individual game tickets will be sold.

In addition to the regular ticket office hours of 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., the A&M ticket office will also be open during and after this weeks home basketball games with Texas Tech on Wednesday night and with Houston Sunday afternoon.

5K run slated for Saturday

The Run Against Torture is a publicity and fund-raising event for Amnesty International's Campaign To Abolish Torture, co-sponsored by the Texas A&M Roadrunners and AI.

This 5K run is open to runners of all ages. The start will be on Joe Rout Blvd. in front of G. Rollie White Coliseum on Saturday, Jan. 26 at 8:30 a.m. Shirts with the AI logo will be given to the first 100 entrants on the day of the race.

Registration is \$6 per person in advance, or \$8 on the day of the race. All proceeds will be donated to AI. Pick of registration forms in Room 216 of the Memorial Student Center or at the AI table in the MSC, Jan. 23-25.

Poor fan support cited

Kings may leave K.C.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Confirming months of rumors, the Kansas City Kings announced Monday they had petitioned the National Basketball Association for permission to move to Sacramento, Calif., in time for next season.

Poor attendance this season, poor season ticket sales and "generally weak support over the years," were cited for the move, Kings President and General Manager Joe Axelson told a news conference.

Gregg Lukenbill, a Sacramento resident who heads a group which purchased the Kings in June 1983, called it a "joyous day" for Sacramento.

"Members of the Sacramento business and political community individually and collectively are extremely excited about the opportunity to be a part of bringing the first major league franchise to our vi-

brant city," Lukenbill said. "Sacramento is a beautiful community that is growing so quickly it has become the 20th-largest television market in the nation."

Lukenbill said the Kings lost \$1 million last year, and Lukenbill has said

the Kings will lose \$1.8 million this year.

Kansas City had sold just 320 season tickets this year and efforts to enlist the support of the business community had failed, Axelson said.

"Certainly, that is their right to buy our tickets, just as we have the right to interpret their lack of interest as a clear and very costly indication that this professional basketball team is not going to break even or become profitable in Kansas City," Axelson said.

Under NBA procedure, a committee of owners will be appointed to investigate Sacramento to determine if it can support a team. The committee will make a recommendation to the Board of Governors, who will vote on the transfer within 120 days. A simple majority of 12 owners is needed to approve the move.

Lukenbill and Axelson declined to say what the Kings would do if the transfer application was rejected.
