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
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

# New bills would alter bingo laws

AUSTIN — Two bills introduced in the Senate on Wednesday could make state bingo laws more stringent and provide more money to charitable organizations, a lawmaker

says.
One of the bills introduced by
Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpu Christi, would amend existing bing law to allow the state comptroller office to check criminal records of those applying for a bingo operator's The second bill introduced by

Truan would provide tougher criminal penalties for violations than un der the existing bingo law.

The bill would raise the penalty for violating the bingo law from a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by up to \$200, to a class A misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of \$2,000. A second offense would be changed from a Class B misdemeanor to a third-degree felony.

Truan noted that recent studies of bingo in Texas have indicated that many bingo promoters are taking the bulk of the proceeds for them-selves, when the law intended thatas much money as possible go to spon-
