


Mays also said he hoped the program to get more minority students on the A&M campus would succeed, as well as a similar effort to get more white students at Prairie View A&M.

"I think the programs to get more minorities at A&M seem to be working through the financial aid programs already in place," he said.

Mays was approved by the committee 6-0.

Martin, a former executive assistant to U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, and Warner were approved 5-0. Warner did not appear because his was a re-appointment.

Allison and Whorton, who also were not present because of bad weather, were approved 5-0.

and architecture — do not have any female full professors.

Tsutsui said this probably is not only because women tend to be overlooked for promotions, but also because until the past decade, few women earned degrees in these fields.

We are even worse than other public institutions because of the military orientation," she said. "The A&M statistics are always lower, but the situation has improved. A&M is several years behind other universities, but that's probably true of many schools in the south. This certainly is not the worst place for women academically."

The most recently available University statistics, compiled in Fall 1984, show that overall, male faculty make more money than females. Glenn Dowling, director of the Office of Planning and Institutional Analysis, cautions that looking at overall figures can be misleading.

"The only meaningful comparison is by academic rank within department," Dowling said. "You also have to consider teaching experience, academic workload, research and professional publications. Women make better salaries here than women throughout the state, but the same is true for the men."

Phillips said salaries are reviewed carefully according to individual performance.

"I think that in every college the deans are committed to equal pay for equal performance," Phillips said. "When we review salaries, we look very carefully for any signs of discrimination. If persons have the ability, they are rewarded for it."

at A&M, believed the discrimination affected their ability to do research and ultimately, their rank and salary.

The other six said they had never experienced sexual discrimination while teaching at A&M. These women had teaching experience ranging from six to 24 years.

"I've always been interested in this issue," McDermott said. "I was trying to show that there was a transition because of the historical changes here, which is why I wanted such a split in teaching experience."

"I found that women in isolated departments with only one woman faculty member had problems with discrimination."

A little over a decade after being admitted to the University, women make up nearly half of the enrollment, but changes have been nowhere near as rapid for faculty women.

Statistics show the number of female faculty at A&M is low at every rank. The Executive Summary, a Fall 1984 faculty headcount compiled by the Office of Planning and Institutional Analysis, shows that A&M has fewer women faculty than other state public colleges and universities.

Faculty women at the University of Texas tend to be in the higher teaching ranks, such as associate and full professor, while A&M's faculty women are concentrated in the lower ranks, such as instructor and assistant professor.

A&M's four largest colleges — business, engineering, agriculture
